## TORRES, PERALTA SUCCESSFUL IN CITY COUNCIL RACE

Reminiscent of the 2018 city council election, Montebello voters last month chose to remove its last remaining incumbent, Jack Hadjinian, and elect newcomer Scarlet Peralta.


Hadjinian, who became the City's first Armenian-American council member when elected in November 2011, had been seeking re-election.

When it comes to moving Montebello forward, Peralta has specific goals in mind.

"I want to invest in our future through sustainable development and business practices and build a stronger local economy by encouraging people to shop, work, and live in Montebello," she said. "I would like to see us partner with small business and non-profits to expand family services, and create opportunities for home ownership for young professionals and new families.

Peralta wants to help the City recover from the current

pandemic, followed by the building of a stronger, safer and more lively community that residents can take pride in.



"Before running, my work lay in the non-profit field, bringing resources to working families across South East Los Angeles and later expanded to voter education and political campaigns," she said.



## TIPS FOR A SAFE HOLIDAY SEASON

With the holidays upon us, it's important to remember a few common sense safety tips to ensure the holidays are bright and merry for you and your loved ones.

Law enforcement reminds us we can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware as the potential for robberies and thefts increase this time of year.

When out shopping, always follow COVID-19 guidelines, maintain a safe distance and wear your mask covering. Also, focus on your surroundings, not your cell phone. Park in well-lit lots and be aware of strangers approaching you. Avoid wearing expensive jewelry or accessories. If you must keep packages in your car, lock them in the trunk where they will not be visible. And when heading back to your car, locate your keys before you arrive. Carry your valuables in a safe manner, carry only the credit cards you need, use ATM machines located in secure areas, and never withdraw more cash than necessary.

Thieves look for easy targets during the holidays. Make sure outsiders cannot see inside your home by closing drapes, keep windows and garage doors locked, be aware of strangers at your door posing as couriers or soliciting funds, and use automatic timers to keep your home lit inside and out.

Have a neighbor pick up your mail or request a "Hold Mail" from the post office if you will be out of town during the holidays.

Those traveling can contact MPD to file a vacation watch, this will notify patrol units to keep an extra eye out for suspicious activity.



While Christmas trees are a festive addition to the holidays, they can present an extreme fire danger when they begin to dry out. A single spark can set a dry tree ablaze in an instant. A dramatic increase in the number of needles the tree drops each day means the tree is no longer fresh and should be disposed

Firefighters recommend using non-flammable decorations and LED lights, and caution against linking more than three strands of holiday lights together. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always unplug tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

> > Use a screen to prevent fireplace sparks from entering your home and never burn paper or other material in a fireplace.

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
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## City of Montebello Community Update

## COVID-19 FAQ 9.0

### LIMITED STAY AT HOME ORDER

This past November, Los Angeles County implemented new COVID-19 safeguards in order to ensure the public-health and safety of residents, and their ability to be served in hospitals. The following measures are currently in place:

#### Outdoor Gatherings (In Effect: Nov. 21 - Dec. 21)\*

Gatherings are now only permitted outside, and must be limited to 15 people who are members of no more than three households.

#### Restaurants, Breweries, Wineries, & Non-Essential Retail (In Effect: Nov. 21 - Dec. 21)\*

Must close from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. Non-essential businesses, those that are NOT defined as critical infrastructure, should end business operations at 10 p.m. Essential work is permitted to continue, and food and beverage takeout services are still permitted after 10 p.m.

Establishments Opened for Indoor Operations (In Effect: Nov. 21 - Dec. 21)\* Occupancy is limited to 25% maximum capacity.

#### Personal Care Establishments (In Effect: Nov. 21 - Dec. 21)\*

Services must be provided by appointment only, and services requiring the removal of face coverings are not permitted. Food and drinks cannot be served to customers.

#### Outdoor Family Entertainment & Cardrooms (In Effect: Nov. 21 - Dec. 21)\*

The number of customers is limited to 50% maximum outdoor capacity.

#### Restaurants, Breweries, & Wineries (In Effect: Nov. 25 - Dec. 16)\*

In-person dining is prohibited for a minimum of three weeks, beginning November 25. Takeout, drive-thru, and delivery services are allowed. Wineries and breweries can continue retail operations while adhering to current safety protocols.



## WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE INVOLVED IN AN ACCIDENT

A car accident can be a traumatic experience and many are not unprepared and experience stress from the impact. Here are some tips on how to accident:

1) Call the Police immediately to request a traffic accident report and to request medical assistance. Most police agencies, including Montebello Police Department, will not arrive unless there is someone injured. It is always wise to request immediate medical attention Many times an accident victim does not feel injured on the spot and symptoms of certain injuries are not always immediately apparent, this especially when your adrenaline is flowing. You should request immediate assistance if there are children or expectant mothers involved in the accident as they are more delicate. If you are alone, make the second call to someone who can go help you or gather information in your stead.

minor accidents. There are several reasons injuries usually worsen after the stress of the accident subsides, damage to your car may not be immediately visible, and there may be a false claim by the other party. I have had many clients come to me after trying to resolve the accident amicably and the other party at fault changes their story.

2) If you are physically capable, get the name. address, phone numbers and Driver's license number of all involved in the accident, including passengers. Make sure to get the same for witnesses. Most phones are capable of taking pictures and recording voice memos to store information. If you do not have one, consider keeping a disposable camera in your glove compartment.

3) Get the other driver's vehicle information, includhandle a situation when you're involved in an ing make, model, license plate and VIN number. The easiest way to locate a VIN is to stand outside the vehicle on the driver's side and look at the



6) Seek medical treatment immediately. Many accident victims refuse ambulance service, but seeking medical treatment immediately after the accident can help your insurance claim. The key factor to a personal injury or automobile accident case is 'medical special damages'. When a claim is filed medical evidence is the most important aspect of the case. Insurance companies do not care if you could not go to the doctor because of being uninsured or could not afford medical treatment. They will not offer a fair and reasonable settlement without evidence of medical specials. If you do not seek medical treatment and obtain the proper treatment throughout the claim- there is no proof that you are actually injured.

Most of these factors are not limited to an automobile accident. In fact, they can be applied to any injury situation where you have become injured. Since every matter is unique, an experienced personal injury attorney can help with issues of seeking treatment, establishing a claim, and negotiating a settlement. ## REMEMBERING MELVIN DOUGLAS COKER



Melvin Douglas Coker, known to friends and family as Doug, died on Wednesday, November 11, 2020. He was 79 years old. He died at home from complications of Parkinson's Disease, surrounded by his children and grandchildren. He had recently enjoyed his favorite birthday dinner – chicken fried steak – while watching the first game of the World Series, (safely, of course), with his family. Go Dodgers!

Doug was born on October 21, 1941, in Long Beach, California. The story goes that he stayed in the hospital for \$1.00 a day, while his mother recovered from surgery. The story also goes that he had bright red hair, and one extra toe – both shocking to his father. However shocking, it's been clear all his life he is a Coker – charming, endearing, and handsome.

His family moved from Huntington Beach to Montebello when he was a boy. He graduated from Montebello High School in 1959, and attended Los Angeles State College. At 15, two things mark his story – he became active in DeMolay, and he began working for his grandfather at Koppl Company, the family business. Through DeMolay he met lifelong friends and his beloved wife, Sue, who preceded him in death in 2015. Over time he became manager, then owner and president of Koppl. Today, the company thrives under the leadership of his son-in-law and daughter.

He loved his city, and served as a reserve officer for Montebello Police Department during the 70s and 80s. Here he also built lifelong friendships. As a member of Park Avenue Christian Church in Montebello, he served in a variety of capacities, for many years. He loved his church family, and was especially proud of the work of Park Avenue Day Nursery. Service on their board was his final leadership position.

He enjoyed playing softball, and attending decades of Dodger games with friends and family, plus USC football with "Uncle" Don and Rich. He enjoyed travel, often with friends, or to visit them. Friends were family to Doug.

His life is marked by joyful generosity in big, small, and often unexpected ways. He supported causes, helped families, shared resources, and surprised many. If you knew him, you probably have a story that starts with, "One time, Doug..." and ends with, "...I hope I can bless someone the same way."

He leaves behind a large family of children, grandchildren, and greats, who will miss him: Ruth with her children: Stephanie, Jason, Alice, Cesar, Teresa, Nadine, plus her grandchildren: Nathaniel and Madison; Mary and Kevin with their children: Sena, Joseph, and Benjamin; Carol and Remberto with their children: Savannah and Emily; William (Billy) and Joleen with their children: Ayanah, Elijah, and Micah. He also leaves behind MANY nephews and nieces who love their Unc., and for whom he has been a champion and role model for a lifetime.

1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, reminds us of the temporary nature of this life, and the promise of eternity with God for those who love Jesus Christ: "Brothers and sisters, we do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of mankind, who have no hope ... For we believe that Jesus died and rose again ... And so we will be with the Lord forever ... Therefore encourage one another with these words." During clean-up after the project, Lions felt a sense of pride in knowing that even though it's a challenging time, Montebello Lions are there, to Serve.



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
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#### **BEVERLY HOSPITAL: COVID-19 IMPACT REPORT**

### PHARMACIST'S ROLE IN TAKING CHARGE OF YOUR HEALTH

Managing your medication and understanding medical conditions can be extremely overwhelming and confusing. Medication is constantly changing, new medication is added or discontinued, or individuals may experience side effects or complications from the medication. You may even be confused why you are taking the medication. You may be thinking to yourself, well who can help me? Your pharmacist can help

Historically, we have been taught to turn to our doctors for all of the answers related to our medical conditions and medication. Recently, pharmacists in the community setting have started to have a greater impact in helping patients manage their medical conditions, improve compliance and optimize medication therapy, and make lifestyle changes to improve their overall health. SB 493 is the state landmark law passed in 2013 that recognizes pharmacists as health care providers and lead to the expansion of the pharmacist's scope of practice. Pharmacists are getting more involved in patient care by offering a variety of services, such as immunizations, travel medicine, furnishing smoking cessation agents and resources, furnishing self-administered hormonal contraceptives, blood pressure and diabetes management/screenings, and medication therapy management programs.

The Prescription Shop in Montebello, a locally owned and operated independent pharmacy has demonstrated the benefit that a pharmacist can have on patient outcomes. In September of 2017, the pharmacist was approached by RA, a long-time customer of the pharmacy about help with managing his various medical conditions that had recently become overwhelming and frustrating. The pharmacist agreed to work with the patient weekly to educate the patient about his medical conditions and help to optimize his current medication therapy. In addition, she also monitored his progress in getting his medical conditions managed by reviewing his lab results, and taking vitals at each visit. RA began his weekly visits to the pharmacy in September

2017. At the initial visit his baseline measurements were recorded as followed: Weight 319.2 pounds, Body Mass Index: 45.8 kg/m2, and waist circumference: 61 inches. His medical conditions included: Hypertension (high blood pressure), Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), Asthma, Type 2 Diabetes, and obesity. Many of his medical conditions were not managed optimally and he was taking eight medications to control these conditions. During the initial meeting RA and the pharmacist discussed his expectations from this experience, lifestyle modifications, and completed a comprehensive medication review. An emphasis on lifestyle modifications by eating healthier food choices and incorporating exercise into his daily activity was explained. This helped them to create short-term and long-term goals. RA was motivated to make a change toward living a healthier life, so he began recording his food intake daily, documenting daily blood glucose readings, and slowly beginning to incorporate exercise into his routine.

It has been one year since we began working with RA and he has astonishing improvements to his health. Since September 2017, he lost nearly 70 pounds, reduced his waist circumference about 10 inches, and got his diabetes and blood pressure under control. He has started to incorporate exercise and a healthier diet into his life and continues to document his progress daily. RA is now extremely knowledgeable about his medical conditions and medication, and can make more informed decisions about his health moving forward. These clinical outcomes observed over the past year demonstrates the impact that pharmacists can have on patients. Involving pharmacists in the monitoring and management of medical conditions and medication improves patient outcomes and can lead to the betterment of the patients overall health. A pharmacist can educate patients about their medical conditions, manage their medication and help to optimize therapy. With a better understanding of your medical conditions and medication, you can take control and make more informed decisions about your health RA is one example of the impact that pharmacists can have. There are many others in the community that could benefit from the help of pharmacists.

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

PAC 12 Football - With Covid-19 looming about, the Pac 12 began play in early November playing only Pac 12 teams up to the 2021 championship. Each team will play five divisional games and one crossover game against a non-division opponent, with these six games being evenly distributed between home and away for each team. The seventh and final week will feature all twelve teams in action highlighted by the Pac-12 Football Championship Game, on December 18, which this year will take place in a home-hosted format. The Pac-12 and partners Allegiant Stadium, the Raiders, Las Vegas Convention & Visitors Authority and MGM Resorts International previously agreed to commence hosting of the Championship Game at Allegiant Stadium in 2021 for its two-year run in Las Vegas in order to ensure a successful launch of the inaugural event.

USC - USC (2-0) hammered Utah 33-17 on Saturday night. The Utes looked young, inexperienced and as if they were playing in their first football game of the season. Coach Kyle Whittingham lost too much talent to the NFL Draft after last season. Too many questions to be answered. Griffin opened the drive with first-down completions to Philips and Dulcich to put the Bruins at their own 46. A roughing the passer penalty kept the drive rolling, but Philips couldn't hold on to a 4th-down pass from Griffin, cementing the final result - a 38-35 victory for Oregon. Saturday, December 5, UCLA at Arizona State. Saturday, December 12, the final game of the short season USC at UCLA.

Corey Seager received the National League Championship MVP and the World Series MVP.

In the NLCS Seager smashed his way into the record books with five home runs and 11 RBIs in the series, both of which set NLCS records. He also passed Davey Lopes and Justin Turner for the most home runs (six) and RBIs (15) in a single Dodgers postseason. During the World Series Seager finished with a .400 average and 1.256 OPS. He hit two home runs, had five RBIs and led all players with seven runs scored. "This was just awesome," Seager said after receiving the Willie Mays MVP trophy. "What this teams accomplished this year ... the resilience, the effort, the energy—everything that this team's done this season, it's just fun to be a part of."

LOS ANGELES CHARGERS break their 3-game losing streak and improve to 3-7 by beating the lonely now 0-10 New York Jets 34-28. (Highlight) Sunday's game marked the sixth career game for Keenan Allen with 13-plus catches making the feat the most by a single player in NFL history. He also became the fifth player all-time to record multiple PHOTO: File Photo by Fred Zermeno games with 15-plus catches. Allen also tied the record for the fastest player to reach 600 career receptions in just 96

games. Antonio Brown is the only other player in NFL history to do it in 96 games. Allen finished Sunday with 16 catches tying the team record for catches in a single game. Rookie Quarterback Justin Herbert has five games with 3-plus touchdowns which is an all-time rookie record in NFL history. This extended his NFL record streak of games with multiple touchdown passes to seven. Chargers next two games are at Buffalo Bills and back home against the New England Patriots.

LOS ANGELES RAMS finally got a little revenge over Tom Brady on Monday Night Football. Anytime you can beat Tom Brady, it's sweet revenge for all those past regular season, playoff and superbowl losses. The Rams controlled the field for most of the game until Jared Goff made a couple of crucial mistakes. But yet, Goff knows how to bring his team back from his own mistakes to a Rams 27-24 victory. The victory moved the Rams into first place in the NFC West. Rams wide receiver Robert Woods posted 130 yards on a team-high 12 receptions with one touchdown, while Kupp had a team-high 145 yards on 11 receptions. Goff, meanwhile, was 39 of 51 for 376 yards with three touchdowns and two interceptions. His third gave him 103 for his career, moving him past Kurt Warner for fifth on the franchise career passing touchdown list. Tha Rams next two games are at San Francisco 49ers and then at home against the Arizona Cardinals.



Green Bay Packer Devante Adams tweeted "Cooper Kupp is by far the most underrated wide receiver in the NFL". Kupp leads the team with 64 receptions and 722 yards in 11 games. 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
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




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
