What happens when the Vicar leaves?

When a Vicar leaves a parish to either retire or move on to another parish, the Church enters "interregnum", a period of interrupted ministry. During that time the Church Wardens and PCC take the lead in the church continuing to support the community. The parish – in our case the three Parishes of Barton, Dunstall and Tatenhill - compile a Parish Profile and work together to select a new Vicar. In practice, this may take some months, but services at St Michael & All Angels will continue as before, supported by a number of local clergy.

Remembrance Sunday

80 years since the start of World War II

Following just a few short years after the War to End all Wars ended, war was back. But a very different war fought in very different ways. Our WWII memorial remembers:

Alistair Hair – Lieutenant in the Royal Army Medical Corps – killed 15/4/41 aged 37 and remembered on the Athens Memorial.

Gervase Philips – Royal Engineer with 159 Railway Construction Company – died 17/06/1940 aged 21 and is buried at the Escoublac, La Baule War Cemetery in the Bay of Biscay in France.

Leonard Read – Trooper in the Royal Armoured Corps 7th Queens Own Hussars – died 15/01/1945 aged 39 and buried at the Raveena War Cemetery in Italy.

Charles Downs – served with the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve 101 Squadron – died 18/11/1943 aged 25 and buried in Schoonebeek General Cemetery, in the Netherlands.

William Sherratt – Sergeant, (W. Op/Air Gunner) in RAF (VR) 156 Squadron. He was killed on 29/04/1942 aged 22 and is buried in Bievres Communal Churchyard in France.

John Pennington DFC – a Flying Officer with the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve 106 Squadron. He was killed on 13/01/1943 over Apeldoorn, Holland, aged 27 and is buried in Apeldoorn (Ugchelen-Heidehof) General Cemetery in Holland.

Benjamin Young, a Sapper Royal Engineer, died on 08/08/1941 aged 54. He is buried in St Michael's churchyard and his grave is maintained by the War Graves Commission.
