INTRODUCTION

Auldcathie District Park - why we are here today

The development proposed through the forthcoming planning application is for the restoration of the former Auldcathie landfill site to create a District Park with car parking, access arrangements and associated uses for the benefit of the expanding Winchburgh settlement and wider population.

The proposed restoration and remediation of the former landfill is a requirement of the wider strategic expansion of Winchburgh that was granted planning permission in principle by West Lothian Council in 2012 and which has seen the first phase of 550 new homes a new town centre, neighbourhood park, new roads and landscaping developed in the intervening period. In addition, substantial funding has already been provided for the extension and upgrading of Winchburgh Holy Family Primary School, and Linlithgow Secondary School, as the first steps towards extensive new education facilities being delivered in the Winchburgh CDA from the outset of Phase 2.

The emerging Local Development Plan identifies the site for leisure use following the need for appropriate remediation. Remediation and restoration of such former degraded land is supported in general by national, strategic and local land use planning legislation and plans.

Detailed planning permission was issued in 2014 by West Lothian Council for the restoration and remediation of the former landfill area but that was limited only to the delivery of informal open space and landscaping as the finished article for the site.

The proposals that are now being consulted upon will create a District Park for Winchburgh on a larger area with a wide range of formal and informal open space opportunities for visitors including cycle tracks, fitness trails, play facilities, community growing areas, informal sports pitches as well as soft landscaping and biodiversity areas. This is considered to be a much more comprehensive and efficient use of the former landscape site to the advantage and benefit of the local community and visitors to Winchburgh alike.

The design and layout of the proposed development has been the subject of significant local consultation with Winchburgh residents, school pupils and local community groups already and the proposals on display here are the culmination of significant input into the process prior to the submission of a detailed planning application to West Lothian Council later this year.



Winchburgh Masterplan

Land was allocated at Winchburgh for 3,450 homes in January 2009 when the last West Lothian Local Plan was adopted in 2009. This required that a Masterplan be prepared for the settlement extension at Winchburgh. However, work on the Masterplan and supporting documents for the resultant planning permission commenced much earlier circa 2003/4. The Masterplan presents a clear vision, a flexible development framework and clear design guidance essential tools to turn the opportunity into reality.

In time the Masterplan will delivery c.3,450 houses, a mixed use centre, primary and secondary schools, formal and informal public open space, a new motorway junction and a rail station to serve the expanded village. The Winchburgh Masterplan is being delivered by Winchburgh Developments Ltd.

Development completed to date

To date almost 550 of the proposed 3,450 homes have been completed by a number of different housebuilders. There has also been significant investment in upgrade and new infrastructure such as drainage, water and electricity.

The first phase of the new mixed use centre has also commenced with the commercial development, including a Sainsbury's store, and a public space opening in 2018.

Wheatley Group and West Lothian Housing Partnership have also commenced the first social rent units which will be delivered by West Lothian Council.





Auldcathie District Park

The Winchburgh Master Plan proposed that the north eastern section of the site, adjacent to Auldcathie Landfill, should become Auldcathie District Park. This area will form the largest recreational and sporting venue within the settlement. The proposals for Auldcathie Park are to create a sporting "hub" for the community, providing facilities in this area linked to those required by the co-located secondary schools. These elements together form a "community campus" offering the highest quality and widest possible range of facilities for both secondary schools, the local community and the wider area. A variety of paths through the park will connect into the existing routes and new residential areas, providing a greatly enhanced network of routes, through and beyond the park.

As a result of further technical work and discussion with West Lothian Council it has been proposed that the park area is increased to fully incorporate the remediated Auldcathie Landfill site. The proposals shown here today illustrate and explain how the landfill site will be remediated to form part of the District Park. Through incorporating the remediated landfill site within the park, the area of public open space available will have increased from approximately 17ha in the Masterplan to around 31.8ha as shown on the proposals today. These areas do not include the adjacent land for the schools campus.

The plan below, illustrates the proposed Auldcathie District Park area incorporating the remediated landfill site within the park boundary. The plan identifies the proposed zones within the park, entrance points and the context, including the schools site to the south.

Auldcathie landfill site - what is there?

The former landfill site known as Auldcathie, near Winchburgh, received a variety of wastes between 1986 and 2002, including construction waste and commercial / industrial materials.

The landfill was operated under a Waste Management Licence provided by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA), the operator has since gone into liquidation and the responsibility for management, closure and restoration of the site was subsequently made a planning requirement of the Winchburgh development Area (CDA) by West Lothian Council.

The site is also is underlain by old disused oil shale mine workings. A ground investigation is underway which includes the drilling of boreholes to assess these and whether voids are still present in the ground.

What is planned?

The objective of the restoration works is to ensure the site is safe and suitably managed with respect to both environmental and health / safety requirements. The works will achieve this by undertaking the following works:

- Re-profiling the existing waste mass to achieve a stable profile that ensures appropriate drainage. • Installation of an engineered capping system (geosynthetic clay liner, or similar) - to prevent uncontrolled landfill gas escape and minimise future leachate generation to protect all receptors (i.e., human health, groundwater, surface water, atmosphere, ecology, livestock, domestic animals, buildings)
- Placement of clean restoration subsoils and topsoil to provide protection to the capping system and to support plant growth.
- Installation of surface water drainage systems including ditches and drains to control surface water runoff, prevent ponding and limit future infiltration into the waste mass.
- Installation of a gas management scheme to control landfill gas beneath the cap and dealing with it either in the form of a direct flare, biofilter or possible controlled venting dependent on the current rate of landfill gas production.
- Landscaping Works formal landscaping works will be integrated as part of the District Park.

How will it look and will it be safe?

The restoration works will be subject to Construction Quality Assurance (CQA) monitoring in accordance with engineering best practice to ensure correct implementation of the restoration design. This process provides confidence that the restoration of the landfill will be safe and pollutant linkages to the environment have been broken.

The waste mass will be re-profiled to a more natural landform for aesthetics and to assist in the management of surface water across the site. The final landscaping of the site, including grass seeding and tree planting, will be integrated with the wider District Park with the only evidence of the sites former use being either a gas compound, vent stacks or similar.

CONSULTATION STRATEGY

Importance of consultation - the community shaping their own park

Community and stakeholder consultation has played a significant role in both the development and implementation of the Masterplan proposals. Local people and stakeholders have been involved at all stages in the design and development process at Winchburgh.

WDL believe that the content and quality of the Masterplan has benefited enormously from local people's views and comments along with stakeholder and Council inputs and review.


Through the Masterplan process Auldcathie District Park has evolved to now include the Auldcathie Landfill site, increasing the park area from 17ha to 31.8ha. As a result of this change in location and area WDL has started a consultation process to ensure the community are kept up to date with the proposals and to get input and feedback from the community and key stakeholders on the design of the park.

It was very important we asked the community what they wanted to see in their park. This is significant area and has the opportunity to provide a variety of open space activities to suit all ages.

PMR set out a process to engage with members of the community through group sessions or drop in sessions and also through community members directly contacting PMR through Facebook or email. We thank all those people who have come forward as these views and ideas have shaped what you see today on these boards. We hope that the journey of engagement over the last few months has brought about a dynamic and responsive new park for the growing community and provides for all age groups and levels of ability.

How and who we consulted

The village facebook page and Community Council Facebook was a great source of promotion and enabled people to give their views as individuals and to ask questions of PMR about the proposals. Through this we have variety of comments about what people would like to see and some consistent themes came forward and we were able to be honest openly about elements we could perhaps not deliver in the park but explain that such facilities would be in the school, ie the swimming pool or indoor sports facilities. This channel of communication also allowed for people to email individually to PMR giving their views and comments - many people took this route and provided some very positive comments which have been taken on board as we have designed the park. Hearing how the community use the exiting paths around Auldcathie and how they wish to see these enhanced along with the depth of heritage has helped us think about how we designed areas and will continue to do so.

Meetings with village informal groups and organisations. We were very grateful to the different local groups who allowed PMR to meet with them and hear their views of what they would wish to see in the park, these included:

- Joining the Seniors Thursday Group where PMR gave a presentation to over 35 members of the group and listened to many of the older generation about the village and the wider community parks and what they would like to see
- as the village grows.
- Attending the Friday coffee morning at Winchburgh church to meet regular community attendees. • Meeting mums at the Mums and toddlers at the Winchburgh Church regular session.
- Listening to over 25 Cubs and scouts and their leaders at their Friday night sessions to gain views on teen activities and what anew park means to them.
- Meeting the Dance School Owner to hear what community resources were needed for girls as the village grows
- and how the park could support this.
- Meeting the Bowling Club Committee.
- The Winchburgh Albion football mum's and dad's during training sessions and also assisting as the club which was newly formed as they were concerns over lack of grass pitches in the village for the club to grow.
- We brought community members together to discuss particular interests this lead to supporting the newly formed Winchburgh Growing Group start their community Growing ahead of the park development.
- Regular monthly visits to the Community Council gaining input and answering questions on how the consultation was developing. Feeding back what the community were asking for.
- Meeting members of the Winchburgh Community Development Trust and attending their open day.
- Meeting with the Community Centre Management Committee to gain views on the Park but also the wider community resources in the village.
- Supporting the Gala Day committee

Primary school - over a four week period PMR worked with the primary schools to gain amazing design for the park for over 300 pupils - many shown on the PowerPoint loop today. During this time a P5 class took on the challenge of creating a logo for the newly formed Winchburgh Growers.

Statutory stakeholders

- Three local councillors fully engaged with the consultations throughout the period giving their own views and very much also relaying views they had heard in the community.
- West Lothian Council Open Space Team to ensure we were complying with their strategic aims for a district park West Lothian Council Sports Team
- Chief executive West Lothian Leisure, the organisation who will manage the new adjacent community sport facilities at the new schools.
- Scottish cycling/Mountain Biking Scotland
- Sportscotland
- Sustrans to gain their support for the connections across the village to the park enabling safe off road routes where possible or designated paths were being provided to enable Winchburgh to become an exemplar cycle friendly village.
- Drop In sessions over a two-day period in June WDL hosted a Friday and Saturday drop in session which saw over 40 community members to come and discuss their own views and discuss ideas they may have for the new park. This was a very successful two days drop in.


The consultation journey - How and who we engaged

It was important to gain views from a wide as possible variety of community members and we tried to ensure we were accessible through all forms of possible dialogue.

The community Plan

PMR used a revised version of the masterplan which focussed on community spaces and how they will evolve as the village grows. The wider village plan (shown) and the park plans (shown) helped enormously with discussing where the park was and how it would link to the village through walkways and cycle ways throughout the village. It will be a major feature in the west end of the village and sit adjacent to the new schools so potentially will have a significant role to play in younger and older community lives and therefore needed to respond to a variety of ways different generations within the community will use it. Also through the whole village plan people could see the other parks which are also to be developed as part of the masterplan and how this district park sat in the wider context was important to many members of the community.

To help with gaining community thoughts the plans were distributed via Facebook and placed on boards which were left on display at the Winchburgh Church, at the Primary School main entrance as well as taken to all meetings for groups to discuss. Smaller hard copies were also provided for groups who had limited access to electronic devises or social media.



The Hill and Ecological Zone

The western part of the park will have a distinct country park character, including large woodland areas, areas of wildflower meadow and a community orchard, focusing on habitat creation and biodiversity. This part of the park will be less formal than the area to the east but will remain accessible via a network of signed paths and include a car park with access off the B9080. The landform defined by the remediation works will form a small hill with paths around and a viewing area at the top. The community orchard and bike park will be located on the sides of the hill surrounded by woodland areas.

Adventure Play - Primary school design process

PMR lead a 4 week exercise to involve the Winchburgh Primary School Pupils and the Holy Family RC Pupils in the design of the park. From an initial presentation at assembly to the joint schools the class teachers set the pupils on a mission - TO DESIGN THE NEW PARK ... And they certainly did.

During the process Ian Logan, from the landscape team and Penny visited every class 'in action' and saw how they were getting on with their new park projects.

Each class had chosen their own way to bring the park to life. Some had drawn individually, others collaborated their ideas into one or two designs, some made part of the play park they wanted to see, and other groups made power points and brainstormed ideas to write and present to us.

By the fourth week the two schools came together and presented their idea to us. Some key themes came from the pupils which can be seen in their design and models;

- Flying foxes and zipwires
- Monkey bars or high rope climbing equipment
- Logs and climbing bars
- Slides
- A large major climbing frame reflecting the village such as a castle
- Water play (like the helix featured a lot)
- Witches hat climbing/ moving frame
- Climbing frames
- Tunnels
- Swinging baskets
- Grass areas for picnics
- Places to sit under and chill with friends







Growing in our Park - supporting the community

A key area which came about from the consultation was the response people gave to wanting space to grow food. Two community members came forward and discussed what they would want to see in the park long term in respect of enabling the community to have formal areas to grow food and even cook on site.

These discussions led to the possibility of this project starting immediately as all it required were planters and bringing people together in the village to help bring food into the community which everyone could share. Inspirational community members Vivian and John worked with PMR and WDL to identify how this could happen.

The volunteers rallied others, collected timber and soil and other resources were arranged by WDL suppliers. The group then set about making the planters. Initially this was for 12 planters and has since grown to 20 with another 20 in the pipeline to extend across the village.

It has become a major success story, brought about by incredible people who care about Winchburgh and sharing knowledge, enabling people to share freshly grown food. From the Tally-Ho car park, housing areas, the church and the primary school the planters are popping up throughout the village. In the park, the community garden will become a major growing area, planted and developed by the Winchburgh CGG to continue their amazing work. Use of heritage fruit trees will see an orchard come to life in the Park, this was a wish form the late Mary Miller and the Growers.

The Primary school helped by having a class design a logo and an amazing design has now become a feature across the village on every planter.





PHASING AND DELIMERY

Auldcathie Park - its evolution and your park to be proud of...

The community are proud of the history and heritage of Winchburgh and feel that the Auldcathie landfill area, like it or loathe it, has been a part of the village for many years. The Auldcathie Church and setting of the canal are being respected and reflected within the new park, with views from the proposed café and seating areas across to Auldcathie Church. The use of the Winchburgh brick is proposed, where possible, for marking pathways and entrance features to the park.

The community wanted to know how they could be involved as the park develops. Involvement can be in the form of, assisting with the design and layout of the play park by the primary school pupils to getting hands dirty planting out the new community growing areas.

The Community Development Trust have intimated that they would like to discuss possible involvement in any enterprise opportunities, such as the cafe or any other initiatives which may arise.

The park is not static, it will evolve over the next few years, therefore, we are setting a framework based on your comments received today.

It is a park for the community. WDL will leave their legacy but the community must feel they have the park they were involved in developing and bringing to life.

We hope in the coming months and years WDL can continue to work with the community on the park. This could include, Community Growers, to plan the growing areas and the orchard, the Primary Schools to finalise the play equipment, the Development Trust or other enterprise schemes for the café building and other organisations for areas such as the bike trails. Ongoing involvement will ensure the right park for Winchburgh is delivered.

How will the park be phased

The park proposals will not happen all at once. The

park is planned to be developed over a number of years,

starting with the remediation strategy for the landfill site

and other engineering works. Following the completion

of phase 2 it is envisaged that the park will continue to

evolve as Winchburgh continues to grow and the needs

of the community change.

The first phase of the park will focus on the initial remediation of the landfill site and will incorporate all the required engineering works, such as, capping uncovered landfill and installation of gas management.







Phase 1 - Landscape works and remediation work

Following the completion of the initial engineering works, the Phase 1 landscape works will commence. On completion of the Phase 1 works the central area of the park should be open to the public, this will include, the play area, community grow space and dog park. Throughout this phase engineering works will continue within other areas of the park.
