History of the Hall


Built in 1898 as a new Town Hall, its use for this purpose was very short lived, only twenty years, before The Town Hall (Rothes) Ltd. went bankrupt. It was then bought by the T.A. who used it until the 1960's and then followed a period of disuse.

In 1968 the Rothes and District Community Association was formed after two public meetings called by the Rothes Town Council and a plebiscite.

There followed a period of extensive fund raising and with some funds in hand Mr. R.J. Cumming, Banff, was approached regarding his property at 6 - 16 High Street which was considered a suitable site for a new hall. After correspondence, meeting and discussion Mr. Cumming donated the property for a new hall, the only snag being two sitting tenants in the block.

It then came to light that the 'Drill Hall' was available and was bought by the R&DCA in the early 1970's for £1400. It was extensively renovated with grant assistance and became a community centre when completed in 1977 and continued as such until reorganisation of Local Governments in 1996 when Local Authority funding was no longer available. It was handed back to the people of Rothes who renamed it The Grant Hall in memory of three sisters named Grant who had left money for a new hall in the 1930's.

To mark the 100th birthday of The Grant Hall - (the memorial stone was laid by Mrs. Grant, Glen Grant on 4th June 1898) - a Centenary Exhibition was organised.

The event was a great success and much enjoyed by over 300 visitors from a wide section of the community and many ex-Rothesians who returned for a nostalgic visit. The event realised over £600 which will go towards Hall funds. The cake donated by Walkers Shortbread Ltd.

VISITORS' CENTRE

Plans have also been mooted to hold a quiz (or quizzes) about Rothes - something which would suit all ages.

There is a 'Good as New' in the same building, with proceeds going towards the running costs and excess going towards the purchase of Church Hall tables.

Rothesian Dies at 100

John Stuart Craigie died peacefully last week at the Isobel Fraser Home in Inverness having just celebrated his 100th birthday.


Born in Rothes on 13th June 1898, his father was the village barber, John attended Rothes School before starting work with the Inland Revenue. Under age, he joined up in World War I with the Seaforth Highlanders as a signaller and served on the Western Front.

After demob he resumed his career, eventually becoming a tax inspector. After World War II he was involved with the complex task of reorganising the tax structure and helped set up a system which is still used for taxing Members of Parliament.

His wife, Margaret died in 1977 and for the past nine years John lived at the Isobel Fraser Home.

Throughout his life, John was interested in wildlife and residents at the Isobel Fraser Home fondly knew him as The Bird Man because of his remarkable ability to communicate with wild birds around the home.

Mr. Craigie never forgot his Rothes roots and maintained a strong interest in the life of the village. He made generous donations to The Grant Hall and to Rothes Primary School and will be remembered with affection by all who knew him.



THE CASTLEHILL FEASIBILITY STUDY

Touchstone Heritage Management Consultants were asked by the Rothes Council to carry out a study into the feasibility of running a Visitors' Centre in Rothes for the benefit of tourists and of making the Castle Hill site and ruins a visitor attraction. They were also asked to investigate all possible sites for the Centre with their recommendations for the best site, how such a visitors' centre could be funded and run and what could be done with the Castlehill to make it attractive for visitors.

An interim report was received in April and was discussed widely with members of the Rothes Council and of the Grant Hall Committee as the Grant Hall was one of the sites considered. The Parish Church Board was also in discussion with the Grant Hall Committee and the Rothes Council as the old Free Church in the High Street might prove to be a better site for a Community Hall to cover all the needs of Rothes.

A meeting was held with Mr. Michael Glen of Touchstone and Mr. Sam Russell of Law & Dunbar Naismith, Architects, on 18th June and various points raised in the interim report were discussed. The second part of the study which will identify how the capital cost of a Visitors' Centre can be raised and the best way to finance the running of it should be completed by the end of July.

It will then be up to the people of Rothes to decide which of the various options would be the best.

CASTLEHILL SHELTER

FLOODING UPDATE!

At the June meeting of the Rothes Council, members of the public affected by flooding problems came along to listen to and put their points forward to representatives of the Moray Council and North of Scotland Water Authority (NOSWA). Mr. Ritchie of Moray Council explained that a damaged drain at the Filling Station was in the process of being repaired, several ditches had been cleaned and others had been earmarked for cleaning. The Council are aware that water courses from the hill are changing and more work is being done to get a clearer picture of the changes. Mr. Ritchie also agreed to meet with residents of Burnside Street to discuss problems in that area and also to investigate the burn area beyond Provost Christie Drive.

Mr. G. Low of NOSWA explained that one of the problems in the Land Street area was the dual use of sewer drains for surface water, a problem which crops up in older sewage systems.

Both gentlemen agreed that this was a joint problem for their authorities but one they were prepared to work on to reach a solution.

Members of the public got an opportunity to ask questions and to give information which was helpful to all parties concerned.

Moray Council have set up a Flood Prevention Working Party to collect information and set a programme for future flooding works. This group has met several times and it is proposed to spend £24,000 of this year's revenue budget on the Rothes problems with £9,000 being considered for next year's revenue budget. £18,000 of this money is being used to separate the sewage and surface water in Land Street which is a joint scheme with NOSWA who have expressed their commitment to these works although final confirmation is still awaited. £2,000 is for A941 south ditches, £3,000 for Burnside Street / Burn of Rothes and £1,000 plus £9,000 being considered for next year's revenue budget for land acquisition and ditching south of Land Street. A more costly capital budget scheme is being investigated for the Rothes Burn but as the total capital costs required for Flood Prevention in Moray is around £9 million, the timescale for this scheme is unlikely to be clear cut at this time.

Meetings between Moray Council and the Scottish Office to discuss possible grant aid for this problem are ongoing -Council policy has been agreed that all communities involved be kept informed of short and long term plans.

Mr. Ritchie has requested an opportunity to again meet with the Rothes Council and the public; this will be arranged for a meeting after the summer recess.

ROTHES MEDICAL CENTRE

An Autoclave Steriliser at a cost of £2,100 has been purchased by the medical centre as a result of recent donations from the community. Dr. Johnston and staff are extremely grateful for the donations from the public which made the purchase of this important equipment possible.

The recent Centenary / Museum / Exhibition in the Grant Hall brought to mind happy memories for many Rothesians and ex-Rothesians. Among those was ex Rothesian Sandy Buchannan of

Elgin who has many happy memories of the *Rothes Pictures* which were for many years held in the old Church Hall and were attended by young and old alike.

Sandy went to the Rothes Pictures the evening before leaving to start his National Service duty and was given a programme by a friend of the films to be shown during the summer months of 1950.

During his National Service with the 1st Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders, he carried the programme with him to Malaysia and his various postings which included Temerloh, Kuantan and Tapah. On through the years he kept this reminder of his picture going days in Rothes.

When the Centenary Exhibition was advertised recently, that programme of nearly fifty years ago triggered some happy memories for Sandy.

The old coal stoves with their high chimneys and double doors which had to be topped up during the show. The Caretaker, the late Bess Balfour's uncanny knack of refuelling the stoves when the picture was at an exciting bit and the howls of protest from the audience, especially the young ones when the clatter of coal drowned out the dialogue.

Despite the stoves, some of the girls had devised other means of keeping warm! They arrived at the pictures with leather shopping bags with their hot water bottles hidden away inside. The boys got great fun from guessing which of the lassies engrossed in the film had their feet tucked cosily inside a shopping bag!

ROTHES GOLF CLUB

Rothes Golf Club is hoping to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the opening of the course by opening a new club house.

Planning approval has been granted to replace the existing, 25 year old prefabricated building with a new one incorporating the refurbished and renovated Blackhall Farmhouse, the cost of the project being in the region of £150,000 which includes an upgraded access road. Fundraising efforts are well under way and include grants of £30,000 from the Foundation of Sport and the Arts and of £73,000 from the Scottish Sports Council Lottery Fund (i.e. The National Lottery). Approaches to local businesses have been made and help or offers of help have so far been received from Walkers and Cutty Sark; the LEC have indicated that they should be able to make a grant when our final costings are known.

The new club house will complete stage three of our development following the laying out of the course and the acquisition of the ground but extension to a full eighteen holes is unlikely in the foreseeable future owing to lack of contiguous ground.

New members are always welcome and at £75 per annum, with reductions for families, Senior Citizens, 'Country' members and Juniors, the fees represent good value. Jock Eddie, 1 Forsyth Avenue is Treasurer and will be pleased to give you an application form.
