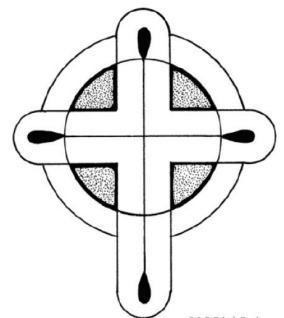

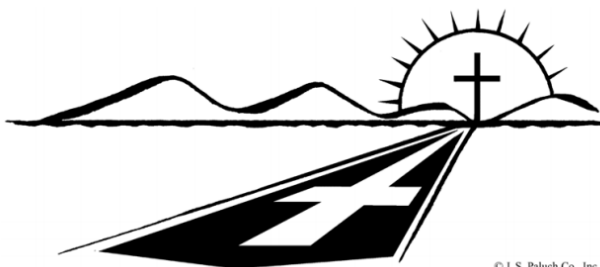
The deposit for the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time was \$12,583.00. Thank you for your generosity and continued support of Holy Trinity Parish.

Be a Trusted Resource if a Child Discloses Abuse. Parents are in a unique position to know about not only their own children, but their children’s friends. If you are a trusted parent, your child’s friend may come to you with secrets. What do you do if a child tells you about abuse? As an adult, it’s critical that you remain calm, and don’t overreact. Child victims are often frightened and confused, and your confusion and anger does not help their situation. Your concern and support, however, will affirm the child in important ways and can help begin the healing process for a child victim who has suffered at the hands of a predator.
