## C-POS Validation Study:

We are excited to have had interest from over 70 sites across England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland, Australia, and New Zealand. We are looking forward to working alongside the teams across the six countries to conduct robust validation of C-POS and ensure it's usefulness in practice.

We are still waiting for final ethical approval but have plans to start opening sites in the new year.

#### **Publications:**



Our original research article on achieving child-centred care for children and young people with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions was recently published in the *European Journal of Pediatrics*. We recruited 106 participants - 26 children, 40 parent/carers, 13 siblings, 15 health and social care professionals, and 12 NHS commissioners. Participants reported many inter-related

symptoms and concerns - physical symptoms, spiritual/existential concerns, social and practical concerns, and emotional and psychological concerns, impacting on all aspects of daily life. We also found an over-arching theme of 'pursuing normality', whereby children wanted to focus on undertaking normal childhood activities. Parents need support with the practical aspects of care in order to help their children realise this desire for normality.
