

Because it is not funded by the State of Michigan or the Federal Government, it is critically important to raise additional "unearned income" to help underwrite museum/marine operations and historic preservation projects. GLSHS Executive Director Bruce Lynn will share a variety of ways in which his organization cultivates donors and raises funding to support the organization's operations.

Panel: Becoming Effective Community Partners as Tailored to Different Types of "Communities"

Panelist 1: **Bruce Lynn**, Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society/Whitefish Point **Building Community with Partnerships**

The Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society works closely with a variety of partners to operate and preserve the Whitefish Point Light-Station. In doing so, GLSHS shares a highly sensitive geographical location, both in the context of natural and human history. To chart the evolution/ preservation of this unique and ruggedly beautiful location, the Shipwreck Society partners with the USFWS, Michigan Audubon Society, and the local community via the Whitefish Point Joint Committee. Bruce Lynn will speak to these, among other community partnerships in this program.

Welcome to Mayberry: How a Small Michigan Town Supported a Big Lighthouse Restoration In June of 2023, the Port Austin Reef Light embarked on a \$1.5 million restoration. Located 2.5 miles from Port Austin, the Board recognized there would be challenges to address. Yet little did we know how many and varied they would be. Learn how ICC Commonwealth, our General Contractor, and the Board of Directors of the lighthouse sourced local vendors, trades and craftsmen, and rallied the support of the county to successfully execute this project.

SHPO: Programs, Partners, and People: Working with Lighthouse Organizations by Bryan Lijewski, with special introduction of Ryan Schumaker

The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) will present an introduction and overview of its mission and programs. Details on programs applicable to Michigan's historic lighthouses such as grants, historic preservation easements, and Section 106 will be provided. Case studies will be included to illustrate how SHPO partners with advocates and stewards to preserve and promote our lighthouses, and how these partnerships connect with people in the community including staff, consultants, volunteers, and tourists.

9:30 am Panel - Retaining Volunteers & Staff, & Recruiting Future Lighthouse Stewards Service Learning at The University of Olivet: Foundation for Lighthouse Preservation Work by Mike Fales, University of Olivet

The University of Olivet has an active Service Learning Program, established in 1999, that engages students in a variety of projects. Some projects include a unique focus on historic preservation combined with local community involvement, such as recent students' work on the Port Austin Lighthouse project. This provides an example for other institutions to develop student engagement programs integrated with larger and ongoing community projects. Other examples of student work have included active engagement in disaster relief work, through which eight Katrina Relief work groups were sent to New Orleans. Other disaster relief services have been provided in Puerto Rico and fourteen states. Students

will be traveling to Maui in May to serve fire victims there. Typically they do eight weekend and three week-long trips each year.

Applying historic preservation theory to practice, the students of the Eastern Michigan University's Preservation Studies program have worked on the Beaver Head Lighthouse on the south end of Beaver Island. They will present a short overview of the station's history, both as an active lighthouse and as an alternative school. The students will also talk about the physical and intellectual work they have accomplished at the lighthouse during field school, a necessary in-the-field education that is a graduation requirement.
