HISTORY OF UNION COUNTY, ARKANSAS by Judge Carleton N. Jerry

On November 2nd, 1829, the Sixth Territorial Legislature created Union County from the southern parts of Clark and Hempstead Counties. Governor Pope approved the formation of the eighteenth county which now comprises all of the present counties of Bradley, Calhoun, Ouachita, and Union, and parts of Ashley, Drew, Dallas, Lincoln, Cleveland, Nevada and Columbia counties. The area covered all of South Arkansas north of the Louisiana State Line from Chicot County on the East side to Lafayette County on the West and Hempstead, Clark, Hot Springs and Jefferson Counties on the North. The Ouachita and Saline Rivers were used as a means for travel from place to place within the county and for transportation of goods for trade within and out of the area. The Sheriff also used these means to maintain peace and order and to assess and collect taxes from the people living in this county.

UNION was given the name to this county at the request and insistance of the group of citizens who presented the petition to the Legislature because they made it in the Spirit of Unison and Unity which existed among the 640 individuals of this new county. They could work and strive for the things that would make their local government and institutions a source of Pride and Joy for their citizens and a happy home to rear their families.

The first county seat selected was Ecore Fabre located on the Ouachita River, which was later changed to the name of Camden. Governor Pope appointed Jonathan Black, Sr. as County Judge, Jonathan Black, Jr. as Sheriff, and John T. Cabeen as County Clerk. They were the first county officials to serve the 640 men, women, children, slaves, and Indians living within their jurisdiction as enumerated in the 1830 Census.

Ten years later in 1839, the county seat was moved from Camden to Scarborough's Landing, which was also a port on the Ouachita River. The name was changed soon to Champagnolle because a Post Office and a Land Office was established there for this area - the Champagnolle District - where the people could file their land claims with Albert Rust, the new land surveyor from Virginia for the U.S. Government Land Office.

Five years later in 1844 the third and last county seat was selected and the name given to this new town was El Dorado - God's Store House because of the fertile soil and the abundance of game found in this area.

Union County became its present size of 1.054 square miles in 1852 when Columbia County was formed from an area from the western part of the county. This was the last county to be formed from the county.

The first white men to see and visit the area which is now Union County was DeSoto. He and his group of explorers came to Champagnolle in December 1541 and found a large village of Caddo Indians living there. They found the Indians with a large supply of food and went into winter quarters there, where they stayed until March 1542 only a few weeks before DeSoto died and was buried in the Mississippi River. While he lived with the Indians, some three months, the first Christian religious services were conducted by the Catholic Priest of his group. The Catholic Father also conducted the first religious marriage ceremony when he conducted the marriage service for one of the Spanish soldiers who married an Indian maiden and chose to remain and live with them. He taught the Indians many things and helped them to improve their living conditions in the area. Building houses and making tools were some of the things he taught them. When the first settlers came to this area more than 200 years later they found the evidence existed of his teachings and influence among the people. These people helped the new settlers in building their new homes.

In 1861 at the time the area seemed to be feeling real prosperity and growth was assured, the county was plunged into the darkest and most dreadful period of all its history. More than 1500 of her young bravest and strong young men marched away from their homes and families to fight the enemy who had invaded their old homeland in the East, from which they had only recently left to find this new home here. More than 1,000 of these men were killed or died before the war was over and never returned to their homes and families. When it ended in 1865, many of those who did return found that not only all they had once owned was lost and destroyed, they also found they were hated by the enemy now in control of the land and had to move somewhere else.

The period of reconstruction was a "period of depression" - for the Carpetbagger stole everything they could find while they were in power for ten long years. They went into homes and helped themselves. They refused to allow the white men to vote or hold any city, county, or state office. They destroyed the records so they could not claim title and ownership to the land and property they owned. In some instances, they hanged and killed the owners in order to steal and take their property. Taxes were raised so high on property that landowners were unable to pay it. They stole all the funds in the public treasury - city, county, and state - sold bonds on the city, county, and state credit and took the funds for themselves. These funds were not used in the public interest or benefit. This left a terrible burden on the people for many years after they were run away.

On January 10, 1921, oil was discovered on land near the western city limits of El Dorado. It was truly one of the greatest oil booms ever in the United States. The population of the county grew from 30,000 to 55,000 enumerated in 1930. El Dorado became the "Oil Capital of Arkansas" when new fields were discovered to the South and then to the East of the City.

They continued on to discover the great Smackover field and then Norphlet, Lisbon, Urbana, Lawson, Schuler, Mt. Holly, Strong, Calion, and Champagnolle as the years passed - and they continued to drill.

The oil resources brought other industries to the county. At the present there are three oil refineries operating in the county, Lion Oil in El Dorado, Cross in Smackover, and Macmillan in Norphlet. Other industries with plants are Monsanto Chemical - producers of fertilizer and other chemicals; J-M Poultry -producers and processors of over 100,000 chickens per day; Cooper Industrial Rubber Products -makers of rubber products for auto and home appliances; Columbia Carbon -producers of carbon black; Prescolite Industries -makers of lighting fixtures; El Dorado Paper Bag -makers of paper containers; Southern Folder and Index Co. -makers of office supplies; four boat manufacturers, and many other small factories and industries.

More than one-halp of the worlds' supply of Bromine is produced and refined in Union and Columbia Counties. Four plants are located in Union County. Great Lakes Chemical Company has two plants, Arkansas Chemical Company and Michigan Chemical Company.

Union County is one of the largest producers and highest in sale of timber and timber products in our nation because 83% of the acreage is growing timber. It is a renewable resource and no area in the world can produce the Southern Pine at the rapid growth rate as in this section of the South.

The nine foot channel being built on the Ouachita River Valley will be completed within a very few years and will bring much cheaper transportation costs for the area.

The Felsenthal Wildlife Refuge of some 65,000 acres will be of a tremendous asset in the production of wildlife for hunters and fish for the sportsmen of the area and visitors who will come.

El Dorado has become the medical center of South Arkansas and North Louisiana, with the two large hospitals owned by the citizens of this county, and the six nursing homes within the county. It is also the financial center, with banking assets of over \$200,000,000.00, which have doubled in the past six years, or since 1970.

The Southern Arkansas University of Magnolia now has a branch in El Dorado. It was established by the Arkansas Legislature during the 1975 session. The Oil Belt Vocational Educational School was established in El Dorado several years ago and has a very important part in the training of highly skilled personnel for the industrial business and medical personnel needed in this area, and also for the surrounding areas.

Union County has the second largest Industrial Park in the state, located to the East of the city and can locate any type industry with all the

required facilities necessary, such as utilities, railroad, highway, air service, and all other needs for any industry.

This county has no bonded indebtedness and is in an excellent financial condition, and providing all of the services the citizens want or expect - which is a very important thing for the welfare and happiness of her people.

The following is an account of an unsolved burglary which took place at Hillsboro in 1886. This narration was included in an article by Dewey Finley and Clayte Whitten published in the El Dorado Daily News in the 1960's.

"A to-this-date unsolved crime is connected with the Williams-Smith Mercantile establishment. It seems that in 1886 the store was ransacked one night with more than \$1,000 worth of goods reported missing. Nearly 25 years passed with no trace of the stolen goods or the guilty party. Then one day in June, 1910, so an El Dorado newspaper of that date says, "light was thrown on the crime.' The Baptist church was under renovation and carpenters, ripping open the high platform upon which the pulpit rested, found the following items: two 135 lb. sacks of coffee in the bean, 6 bolts of domestics, several bolts of dress goods, 14 suits of clothes, two dozen shirts, two trunks filled with pocket knives, razors, harps, buttons, thread, jewelry, children's clothes, jackets, underwear, and many other articles.

Since this was only a part of the 25 year-old loss, it was assumed that while some of the partners-in-crime had taken their loot and fled, at least one of them must have been a local person using the church pulpit as a convenient storage place to be 'visited as needed' or else had had a change of heart and took this means of 'giving it back to the Lord.'"

Editor's Note: Beginning in 1845 and thereafter, all wills and estates are recorded in the Office of the Chancery Clerk of Union County. These first entries from Probate Record (Officer's Bonds and Wills) - Book "A" begin in Vol. 1, No. 1 of Tracks and Traces and continue on the preceeding pages. It should be noted that these Probate Books are indexed by name of the executor or administrator -- and not the decedent. We understand the Clerks are now attempting in their spare time to re-index the early books, which will help considerably in locating a specific estate.

There are two old Deed Books, "A" and "E", in the Office of the Circuit Clerk, which contain the earliest records available (wills, estate, marriage and deeds), after creation of Union County in 1829. There is no Deed Book B, C or D, and no explanation can be found as to why they skip!

Included in the worn pages of the two volumes are the records of BRADLEY, DREW and CLEVELAND Counties (plus parts of Dallas, Ashley, Calhoun, Nevada, Lincoln and Lafayette) through December of 1840; OUACHITA and COLUMBIA Counties through November 1842; and many entries from the central and northern Parishes of Louisiana. For this reason, these early records are of great genealogical importance over a wide area of the State.

We begin in this issue to abstract these early entries, with the exception of the marriage bonds which have already been published by our member, Annie Laurie Spencer, and are available through her or by writing the Society at P. O. Box 1202, El Dorado, Arkansas 71730.

Those families named in the pages to follow are <u>on record</u> as the true pioneers of southern Arkansas. Many appear in the 1850 Union County Census who were in the area as early as 1820.

The following excerpt was taken from an article on Hillsboro by Dewey Finley and Clayte Whitten published in the El Dorado Daily News in the 1960's.

"One of Union County's least known but most novel industries ...
'folded up' before the century (nineteenth) was over. It was the
making of souppernong wine from the Holbrook vineyard, which later
became the C. P. McHenry property. The original Holbrook from 'up
north' was reported to have emigrated from Switzerland, bringing with
him his recipe for the rare vintage that was locally grown, brewed,
and shipped far and wide."

Another item of interest in this article concerned the cemetery at Hillsboro.

"One of the most unusual stones in the cemetery is ... one made of metal. It is hollow and the sides can be unscrewed. It marks the grave of Alice Floyd, whose husband, Henry Floyd, was a Hillsboro school teacher. Born in Scotland, he was said to be well versed in languages and to have served as a spy for the Union Army during the War Between the States.

One of the oldest stones in the cemetery belongs to Elijah Shulen-berger, who died a month before the outbreak of the War Between the States. He was a German and came from 'up North,' Reading, Pa. J. P. Shulenberger installed Union County's first gin and mill."

"Col. J. C. Wright reached home last evening from an extended tour through the northern part of the State."

"Mr. Warren Richardson, Engineer at the Hillsboro Mill, died of pneumonia at Hillsboro, on Friday morning last, the 18th inst. Deceased was about thirty-five or six years of age, an able and useful man in his calling, and will be sadly missed by the community which has so long been aided by his valuable services. His place cannot easily be filled. He leaves one son at Hillsboro, aged about 12 or 14 years, a quiet, intelligent and well-behaved youth, who has the kindest sympathies of the entire community."

September 6, 1883, Local Intelligence

"Notice is hereby given that at the next October term, 1883, of the Union County Court, the undersigned freeholders of Union County will present their petition to said Court asking that a public road be opened from the forks of the road at the Keesee place, on the Hillsboro and Grand Mary Lake road, to the Louisiana State line on the Pigeon Hill and Louisiana Line Road.

"Mr. W. H. Crawford, only brother of Mrs. Dr. Johnson, of this place, died at his home, near Hillsboro, about half past one o'clock Thursday last, after an illness of seven days. Deceased was about thirty-five years of age, and enjoyed the good will and esteem of a large circle of friends and acquaintances, who deeply sympathize with his loved ones in their sad bereavement. He leaves a wife and one child, an aged father and a number of relatives, among whom his place can not be filled."

The following letter was mailed to Miss Jennie Stevenson, Cole Grove, Pennsylvania and was postmarked Hillsboro, Union County, Arkansas, November 1, 1884.

Dear Cousin Jennie;

Forgive my long delay in answering your welcome letter. We are having lovely weather now, have had frost for several mornings. The woods are gay with bright colors of autumn, though they are not near so bright and pretty as they will be a few weeks later. I think nearly all the farmers have gathered their crops, corn, cotton, peas, potatoes being the principal things raised. A good many of them made their molasses at home.

And your grandmother thinks you are not worth much else, but to humor sick folks, I think that means you are worth a good deal, for you could not do this, unless you possessed several desirable qualities, and among them a good share of patience. I hope you will like teaching better than I did. I do not think I will ever earn my living in that way.

I could not help but be amused when I read you thought I was sensible to have never married and when you hoped I would never marry, and that you never would.

Are you sure you are making a good wish for me and yourself when you wish we may never marry? Surely a real, genuine, love match is better than single blessedness, and I expect to hear someday that you have changed your opinion upon this subject. I cannot say that I will never marry, I was so supremely foolish as to look in the well in a looking glass on the first day of May once, and was rewarded for my impudence, though I did it only for fun, without the <u>least faith</u>, by the sight of someone they tell me I will surely meet sometime and who will certainly be my lord and master. Time will prove whether this superstition is correct.

I, too, am fond of reading good novels and poetry. Read David Copper-field last winter. Have not read a novel this year.

One of our young lady friends is with us this week and last night my brothers were going 'possum hunting and we went with them. What fun we had. Flora, Minnie, Gussie and myself. They made the woods ring with snatches of songs and laughter. We must of frightened the 'possums nearly out of their five senses. We did not catch a one, but found plenty nice persimmons to eat. We had gone nearly a mile from home on a road leading to one of Pa's fields, when we discovered a drunk man was riding behind us. The girls and the smaller boys were some distance ahead of Buddie and me, running so fast I thought every second their torches would go out. We hurried our steps, overtook them when we all left the road to go to some persimmon trees. But the drunk man followed us until Buddie went to him and told him he was lost, gave him directions, and we were glad to see him go.

Editor's Note:

Iula Wood Stevenson was born November 2, 1861 in Hillsboro the second of thirteen children of Charles W. Stevenson, born 1826 at Marion, Perry County, Alabama, and Elizabeth Marion Radford, born 1838 in Tennessee. Charles W. Stevenson migrated with his family to Hillsboro in 1844 from Alabama with the head of the family group being his father, Jesse Stevenson, as well as his uncle, Larkin B. Stevenson. Both Jesse and Larkin B. took up federal land in the area. By 1860 Charles had acquired land valued at \$3,000 and personal property valued at \$16,000. He farmed his land and also owned a cotton gin at Hillsboro. Three of Charles and Elizabeth's children died in childhood. They apparently believed in the benefits of education for among their surviving ten children were a doctor, two druggists and two teachers. Iula was a teacher at one time as mentioned in the letter to her cousin. This letter is certainly evidence of a good educational background for a young lady of that day.

Iula was also quite accomplished at "Scherenschnitte" the old Swiss-German art of scissor-cutting. She would cut intricate designs out of white paper without the benefits of patterns. Her creations included tiny birds, butterflies and flowers and upon completion were mounted on black velvet. Some of these works of art are still in existence today.

On October 3, 1888 Lula married at Hillsboro to Ben J. Williams, son of Simon H. and Amanda P. Tisdale Williams of Caddo Mills, Texas. Lula's son was born at Caddo Mills on August 20, 1889 and died that same day. Four days later the combined effects of childbirth on a body already weakened by tuberculosis and sorrow for the death of her child resulted in Lula's own death on August 24.

Minnie Irene Stevenson, mentioned in her sister's letter, was the first school teacher of Concord, Arkansas (presently known as Strong). She married James Turner Harper and they were the parents of two other Union County school teachers, Iula Harper Gill and Pearl Harper Ellzey. Mrs. Ellzey was the first principal of Yocom School in El Dorado from 1926 to 1927. We are very grateful to Mrs. Gill's daughter, Flora Gill Lovett, for sharing this charming letter and providing details of the history of her Stevenson family.

CIVIL WAR MUSTER ROLL

The Ninth Arkansas Infantry Regiment was organized at Pine Bluff in July of 1861. Several companies were made up of Union County volunteers as was Company "G". The Regiment included over 40 preachers and for this reason was frequently called the "Parsons Division". The original "muster roll" of Company "G", a scroll about 8 feet long, was in the possession of S. C. Baskin of New London. In 1916 at the request of J. M. Wallace of that community a certified copy of the document was handwritten by H. G. Williams. The original scroll was placed in the hollow cornerstone of the present Union County Courthouse. Mr. J. M. Wallace was the uncle of Mrs. H. C. McKinney, Jr., of El Dorado, to whom we owe a debt of gratitude for the loan of this valuable document. E. F. Rowland and M. K. McKinney were the grandparents of Mr. and Mrs. McKinney, respectively, and both were members of Company "G".

"BEECHLAND"

Beechland, the pioneer home of the Aylett H. Buckners was located west of the Smackover-Lisbon road to Mount Holly. The old Scott place was nearby. They were in the vicinity of the old George Yocum place, which was on the east side of the road that leads to Lisbon about 10 miles from Mount Holly proper and 5 or 6 miles from the Wright place.

When I was young (after I married in 1937) I remember going to this old place and seeing the bee-house which was still standing until several years ago. The following information was taken from an article in the Arkansas Gazette dated Sunday, August 29, 1948.

"The Buckners were lovers of adventure and walked a great deal of the way wherever they went. Turner Buckner visited his brother Simon Bolivar Buckner in New York and walked all the way there from Kentucky. When his family first moved to Arkansas, Turner walked and let a negro servant ride his fine saddle horse.

Christmas of 1851 was a sad occasion at Beechland. Mary Elizabeth, who had married John A. Tooke, and Bolivar and Turner were expected home. Before their arrival their father, Col. Buckner, died after a brief illness on December 11 and was buried in the private cemetery of his neighbor, Maj. D. F. Coulter.

In his delightful booklet, <u>Pioneer Days in Arkansas</u>, the Rev. S. H. Chester mentions Col. Aylett H. Buckner as being 'an interesting accession' to that group of pioneers who settled in the early 1840's near the border or Union and Columbia Counties whose names, McRae, Dews, Lewis, Parker, Strain, Smead, and others are widely known in our state today. They formed a sort of Presbyterian Colony.

Mrs. Aylett Buckner belonged to the Presbyterian Church. This lady, like her husband, was of Virginia ancestry. Her father, Col. Turner Morehead, fought with distinction under Gen. Wayne at Stony Point in 1779. Rev. Chester said of Mrs. Buckner, 'she was a woman of strong character and of a masterful spirit and managed her plantation successfully ... left alone in widowhood. Ann Turner Morehead Buckner lost 6 of her 9 children in infancy or childhood.' After being forced to leave Washington and her

son she again sought refuge among her friends in Arkansas. Soon after that she died of pneumonia on January 8, 1862, at the home of her friends, the Coulter family. In comparatively recent years, her ashes and those of her husband were removed to Frankfort, Kentucky for interment in the burial plot of their distinguished son, Maj. Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner.

Mrs. Tooke was widowed in 1858. In 1877 she went to the old family home in Kentucky to reside with her brother Gen. Buckner and his mother-less daughter, Lily. For some time Edwin Tooke managed his uncle's farm there at 'Glen Lily.'"

Several years ago my son, Lewis Walter Smith, my mother, Mary Thompson Lewis, and I went on an excursion into the woods to locate the old family cemetery. Mr. Frank Willet's son, Buford, accompanied us. We found the plot and hugh trees are growing around the tombstones. I listed the names and dates. Two bodies had been removed some time ago, 20 years at least. These are all the stones we found:

WHITE CEMETERY OF OLD BEAR CREEK CHURCH (METHODIST CA 1900)

A cemetery in Union County that is virtually inaccessible is located deep in the woods to the rear of Mose Richardson and A. B. Richardson's homes. These are on the Lisbon Road after leaving Highway 160 (Smackover-Mount Holly Road). This has sometimes been called the Old Young Cemetery.
