
## Our Shrinking Ingredient Choices

This column was prompted by a news item that I read last month about a proposed ban by the City Key West on the sale of sunscreens containing either Oxybenzone (INCI name: Benzophenone-3) or Octinoxate (INCI name: Ethylhexyl Methoxycinnamate). I know that use of Oxybenzone has been under regulatory pressure for several years due to its alleged harmful effect on coral, but this is the first ban regarding Octinoxate that I have heard about. As a formulator who occasionally works on sunscreens, I think banning Octinoxate will create big problems This is one of most commonly used UV filters and is very effective for increasing SPF. According to frequency use data collected by the FDA, it is used in over 4700 commercial products in the U.S alone. Given the rather short list of permitted sunscreen actives for the U.S. market, we can't afford to lose another one.

Unfortunately the banning of particular cosmetic ingredients by countries, states, and now city governments is part of a trend that has been going on for at least 20 years. This trend is accelerating. Part of the reason is the "greening" of our industry driven by consumers who wish to use products based on "natural" ingredients. I have no problem with that because it is driven by market forces and if consumers discover that natural cosmetics don't work as well as traditional formulations, market forces will lead to the return of ingredients with proven performance. But the driving out of ingredients based on dubious science or ill-founded safety issues should be a concern to all cosmetic chemists. Who among us has not been required to spend time re-formulating products in order to eliminate ingredients that have been flagged by industry critics (parabens, silicones, formaldehyde donors - the list grows every year). I suppose this represents a kind of job security for formulators, but I would rather spend my time focused on developing safe and efficacious formulations and using my expertise to make ingredient choices based on performance and cost using my knowledge of ingredient chemistry. As a society of cosmetics chemists, we represent our industry and should be prepared to push back against pressure to limit our choices when doing formulation work.


