Superintendent Jim Bailey's Park Report

- ◆ Thank you for the Friends' support of Juneteenth. Your scholarship program is a wonderful tribute to the legacy of Booker T. Washington.
- ◆ The retirement of **Timbo Sims** at the end of May left the park in the unenviable position of replacing someone whose institutional and historical knowledge was unrivaled.
- ◆ The loss of Facility Maintenance Worker **Kevin Phifer** in late June hit the staff very hard.
- Of the 15 positions on our organizational chart, 8 are currently

vacant.

- **Connie Mays** continues to support administration at Appomattox Court House NHP in addition to Booker T. Washington NM.
- **Brittany Webb Lane** is acting as lead for Interpretation, Education, and Visitor Services until we can get someone to detail into Timbo's position.

Park-Wide Updates

- The park had a major pump failure two weeks ago that required staff to manually take water down to the farm; maintenance has developed a short-term fix, but Facility Maintenance Chief **John Mitchell** is working on a permanent solution as well since the system as built is no longer needed.
- VC should proceed at the VC shortly, perhaps as soon as the beginning of September. Work at HQ will have to wait for specific parts and will not begin for at least another four months.
- ♦ Paving project should begin at the end of the month.



Heritage Garden Update

The Heritage Garden continues to have great volunteer participation. Every week, at least six and sometimes as many as ten volunteers, arrive early Tuesday morning to pick vegetables, rake soil, shovel wood chips or chicken coop compost and fill the back of a Kubota with weeds.

Below is a photo of some of the volunteers who arrived at 8 am one hot, August morning. Almost all of our volunteers are Franklin County Master Gardeners. Some volunteers are new trainees or

interns who learn about growing vegetables while others have been working in the garden for more than a decade. Even the 'old timers' learn something new every year and get a kick out of some of the heirloom varieties we try. For instance, a 'fish pepper' has the shape of a fish, variegated foliage and is extremely hot while the fruit of 'dragon's tongue' wax beans have purple mottling on a background of yellowish green.

This year, we've had some challenges. Unfortunately, our Russet potatoes succumbed to fungus and the sweet potatoes leaves have been eaten twice by what we suspect is a ground hog. Even okra leaves have been eaten (usually, **nothing** eats okra). And the flax bed was easily overtaken by 'quick weed', a Galinsoga species naturalized to the U.S. It is a very aggressive, that is ingredient Columbian soup а key in а ajiaco. Despite these setbacks, the Heritage Garden crew remains undaunted as we focus on our successes: bountiful onions, garlic, beans, cucumber, 'patty pan' squash, heirloom tomatoes and peppers all going to Lake Christian Ministries. We even have a few 'stars and



stripes' watermelon growing (see yellow 'stars' in photo above)—until the ground hog finds it, of course.



Rooster and Chickens:

pant (do not sweat), seek shade, open wings for circulation, drink a lot of water, lose heat through their feet, comb, legs and wattle Summertime and the livin' is easy (Gershwin, Porgy & Bess)—unless

it is a heat wave! We have had some very high temperatures these past two summers. So...what do we need to do on the farm to keep our animals comfortable? There are some things we farmers can do to help the animals, yet each animal has its own instinctual ways of handling the heat. **They must be provided with:** a source of shade, fresh and cool water, mud pools for the pigs, a cool sponge bath for IceMan the horse if he is overheated, and a salt block in the pasture for the sheep and the horse.

INSTINCTUAL BEHAVIORS OF FARM ANIMALS

Seek shade, drink a lot of water, minimize activity, graze early and late in the day, one inch of fleece (wool) will help divert heat, encourages the consumption of water, shearing of the sheep in the spring





Pigs: Emmy and June drink a lot of water, limit activity, seek shade, wallow in mud pools, the evaporation of mud drying and cooling provides a layer of protection from the sun, pigs do not sweat



And us? Humans over the years have kept cool by changing their clothing, getting out of the city, using hand-held fans, summer kitchens to keep the house cool, living outdoors, windows installed to bring in a breeze, swimming, created open central stair hallways, electric fans and air conditioning. What's your best cooling remedy?




