Been There, Done That



Plzeň

If you were in north Texas this summer, you know that it had been brutally hot. One night with dinner, I felt liking having a "cold one" for once (instead of wine). Not just any beer, but this one (see left) specifically.

Why? Going through my china cabinet recently, where I have a small collection European beer glasses, I found my beer glass for Pilsner Urquell. This glass is from 1986, when I spent most of that year working in Switzerland (and also a bit in Germany and the UK). As a result of finding this beer glass hid-

ing in the back of my cabinet, the next time that I went to buy some beer, I bought a bottle of Pilsner Urquell!

During my various travels throughout Switzerland in 1986, every time that I went to a restaurant and had a beer, I asked nicely if I could buy a glass (and that I would take it back to the USA with me). Sometimes they would give it to me for free and other times I had to pay a buck (Swiss Franc actually) or two. Somehow these nicely printed beer glasses all survived my move from Switzerland to Kentucky to Texas.

Now here is also something to know (especially if vou've never had a beer in a German or Swiss restaurant): Every time that I was served a beer (whether from a bottle or on tap), it was ALWAYS served in a glass that had THAT beer's name & logo printed on it. Never just a plain glass. The restaurants and bars get their printed glasses from their distributors (so more than likely, they would have to pay for them, but I'm not 100% sure of that). In any case, I wanted some nice souvenir glasses to take back from Europe. At last count, I have 16 of them.

Now then, how does all of that above tie into the "Been There ..." philatelic theme? I have NOT been to the hometown of Pilsner Urquell in the Czech Republic, which is natively called "Plzeň". But, at the last TSDA bourse on August 25, I ended up at John Topper's booth and bought a nice registered cover for \$1 that was postmarked from Plzeň in 1927 (best as I can tell based from the postmark at right).

Werdenberg

Think of a country that is roughly twice the square area of the greater Dallas / Ft. Worth area. Now think of that area having around 500 castles & fortifications. Are you thinking of Switzerland yet?

Despite Switzerland having put various castles ("Schloss" in German) & fortifications

("Burg" in German) on their stamps over the years, I have yet to find a stamp that shows the Werdenberg Castle.

However, neighboring Liechtenstein has issued 2 stamps commemorating the count of Werdenberg ("Graf" in German) on Scott #386 from 1964 and also on a 1995 Frama ATM stamp.

So what do the Liechtenstein stamps have to do with Werdenberg

Castle located in Switzerland? For that you'll have to go WAY back to the Holy Roman Empire (roughly 800 to 1806 AD), when that area was a "county" (1230 to 1247) within the Holy Roman Empire, which included parts of what are now Switzerland, Liechtenstein and Austria.

The castle of Werdenberg was built around 1230 in what is now the Swiss town of "Grabs". It is a beautiful medieval castle, and well worth a visit if you're ever in Switzerland.

Roughly 23 years ago, on September 3, 2000, Annie & I visited the castle (see entry ticket above) and the village at the base of the castle grounds, as shown in the photo below. As you can tell, it was a rainy day, but I always enjoy visiting castles & fortifications

Philatelic Greetings from Far East Texas

Some of you might know that the reason that Karen and I moved to East Texas is because Karen developed Lewy Body Dementia. Our daughter and her husband asked us to jointly buy a home, large enough for us all to live together without being in each other's way, so that they could help me with her care giving. Karen's had a mild case of the disease for 4 or 5 years, but this year it's taken a sudden change for the worst.

I met a woman at the Longview bowling alley because she wore a shirt showing that she belonged to the "East Texas Authors Society". When she told me that they were going to have their 21st annual local author's book signing on November 4th, I signed Karen up for one of the 25 tables.

Karen's three books that are illustrated with postage stamps depicting fairy tales, folk tales, legends and island mythology, are her proudest achievement, and I wanted her to be able to get a dose of the pride that is rightfully hers because of her books. None of you know it, but when Karen finished "Tales by Mail – Book 1", we entered it in the 2001 Benjamin Franklin Award, book competition. She did GREAT, in that out of 15 categories among the Book Evaluations, she averaged 9.58 on a scale from 1 to 10 in the category of Best First Book. Then in the category of Best New Voice, she averaged 9.67. Finally, in the category of Best Design, she averaged 9.93. It was an outstanding success!

Someone gave a copy of her first book to Gwen-

dolyn Jones, Professor Emerita at The College of New Jersey, who was also the President of the *National Story Teller's League*. She liked the book so well that she wrote to Karen to ask if she could write the "Foreword" to her 2nd book. In it she wrote, amongst other things, that this was "A wonderful collection of 32 folk tales, complete with splendid, glossy facsimiles of depicting the characters of the stories---". To that she added, "I recommend this book for its story quality and for its usefulness in promoting the National Story League's U.S. Postal League Project to Honor the art of Storytelling".

I'm hoping that Karen's dementia would still not be so severe by November that she wouldn't be able appear in person to get some pride in selling some of her books on November 4th and watching people skim through the images of stamps to get an idea of what was contained in the book's pages. I'll sit next to her at her table and assist her, and I have also made a 3-fold tabletop display board for her.

At the September 6 meeting in Arlington, about 50 out of 70 lots were sold at the auction.


This year's annual "Spark Plug," award was presented to Skip Ely. He does all the meeting notices, handles our auctions and runs the Beginner's Table at EXPO.

TV Philately: A Million Miles Away

In September 2023, Amazon Prime released the movie "A Million Miles Away". It is the inspirational story of Jose Hernandez, the first migrant farm worker to become a NASA astronaut.

The movie follows Jose over several decades, from a child in the rural village in Michoacán, Mexico; to picking fruits & vegetables in California's San Joaquin Valley, to being a flight engineer aboard the Space Shuttle Mission STS-128 in 2009 (when he also stayed on the ISS (International Space Station) for 2 weeks.



This movie is about determination. As an elementary school child, he told his teacher that he wanted to be an astronaut. And he did in the end! His inspiration was that he heard on the radio (while working in the fields when he was a senior in high school) that Franklin Chang-Diaz (of Costa Rican descent) was chosen for the Astronaut Corps (making him the first Hispanic astronaut). Jose trained in all sorts of disciplines, worked as an engineer at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (where he helped co-develop the first full-field digital mammography imaging system).

He applied at NASA 11 times in the 1990's and early 2000's and was rejected every time before delivering the 12th application in person. In the screen shot above, at around 59 minutes 48 seconds into the movie, we see him depositing one of the applications in a USPS blue mailbox. It doesn't state exactly when this was, but my guess is either 2000 or 2001.

Since what is portrayed is an outgoing piece of mail, there are of course no postmarks present. The envelope shows 2 stamps paying the domestic 1 ounce rate of 34¢ (which would have been correct for 2001, and it was paid by a 32¢ & a 2¢ stamp. What puzzles me is the use of the particular stamps shown.

It is possible that he would have had some older stamps from 1995, such as the 32¢ William T. Sherman stamp (Scott #2975q); but the use of 1937 2¢ Navy stamp (Scott #791) featuring Stephen Decatur and Thomas Mac-Donough kind of baffles me. Unless you're a stamp collector (which I don't think Jose was..), this is not just a random 2¢ stamp that someone would have available to use.

Is there some significance to these stamps being used on this application sent to NASA? I don't know my US history well enough to know whether that plays into anything here. My guess is that the props department simply grabbed something to use in order to end up with the 34¢ that was the rate at the time, but surely they could



As usual though, these don't appear to be real stamps, but some sort of reprints. The first

clue is that neither stamp shows perforations. They seem to be either

any sort of regular perforations. They seem to be either roughly cut (or possibly rouletted as on the 32¢ stamp).

So I decided to make a scan of my own stamps of these designs, which are shown in actual size above.

The first thing I see is that the image of the 2¢ stamp appears a bit stretched horizontally. Also, the color is a bit off, with a totally different shade of red.

On the 32ϕ stamp, the colors are also off a bit, the uniform appears more "bluish" in nature, compared to the medium gray in the real stamp. On the fake stamp, the button on the coat are a much lighter, almost whitish shade, while on the real stamp they golden colored.

As far as the addresses go, the NASA address in Houston seems to be the correct one. However, the return address doesn't exist. While Jose and his family did live in Stockton, California, the street address shown of 320 Newton Street does NOT exist. There is a "Newton Road" though, but the street numbers there are in the 4000's, and the Zip Code is 95205. Newton Road appears to be an industrial neighborhood, not residential (I checked this on Google Maps). On the envelope, it also shows a Zip Code of 50309, which would be Des Moines, lowa, not Stockton, California!

So, although the NASA address was correct and the postage amount shown was correct, the use of that old 2¢ stamp is questionable, and none of the stamps are the real thing! So as usual, they didn't quite get it 100% right ... But as you know, that envelope only appears on screen for about a second, you can only make out details if you pause the screen. In any case, I can highly recommend watching this movie.

So what do you do for Valentine's Day? Why, you go to London of course (you know, the one in England, not Texas)!

But why London? Simple. In 1999, my (at that time, future wife) Annie & I went on a trip to Switzerland and we flew American Airlines from Dallas to London, and then on British Airways on to Frankfurt (for the simple reason that American doesn't fly direct to Switzerland from Dallas, only from Chicago, and on an overnight flight like this, I didn't really feel like switching planes).

So what better way to get around than the "Underground" (or "The Tube" as it is nicknamed), as that is what they call the London subway system? But it decidedly did NOT look like how it is depicted below on Ghana #2738 (from 2013), as that depicts the Underground as it was back in the Victorian days... It looked exactly like the picture above that has me in it, taken at the Shepherd's Bush station on Feb. 13, 2000.

We used the Tube every day while sightseeing in London. And as always, I try to save my tickets from trips, and here is one from Valentine's Day 2000!

The Underground first opened in 1863 using steam locomotives (which must have been horrible under ground...) and in 1890 started using electric traction trains. Even though it is called the "Underground", only about 45% of the current system is "under ground". The system now comprises 11 different subway lines with a total of 250 miles.

The logo of the "Underground" is a red circle bisected


by a blue rectangle with white text, as shown on the label on the right (which is attached to a Great Britain #2028A). I literally just found this a couple of

That said, while Dallas' "DART" light rail transit system is not a subway system, it does actually have an underground station at the Cityplace / Uptown station (which allows you to connect to the old 1920's trams in Dallas!). So that actually makes it 4 different "under grounds" I've been to!

In the meantime, "Mind The Gap" (as they state on all the Underground train platforms), and I did!
