



Redeemer Episcopal Church, Greenville, MS; the only Black Episcopal Church in Greenville. Edna was christened at Church of the Redeemer, Greenville, MS. At the age of 5 months old, Edna and the family (including older sisters Alverston, Mickey and Peggy) moved to Chicago. The search for an Episcopal Church landed Hattie Fox at St. Thomas in 1939.

Edna has been a member of the Rector's Guild for more than 37 years, many of them as president. Because of her years of distinctive service to the Rectors of St. Thomas and the entire church community, Edna was recently elected to President Emeritus. Her steadfast and heartfelt commitment consistently exemplified the highest personal, spiritual and responsible leadership executed with confidence and humility. Her leadership has been an inspiration in support of the goals and visions of three St. Thomas Rectors with whom she worked side by side. She is an exemplary role model for the women of St. Thomas. The Rector's Guild was organized in 1941 to serve the church and the Rector. My church life began as a child in a Bible Church in Chicago. I went every week with my mother, grandmother, and sister

(of blessed memory). I learned that Jesus loved me. Another influential part of my religious education was living in a three-flat with two Jewish families with whom we had warm relations. When we lived in Oak Lawn, mother took us to Oak Lawn Presbyterian Church. It was beautiful in its austerity, and I continued to learn of the love of Jesus while getting some basic Calvinist theology. I attended until the last semester of high school, when I announced I would not be going anymore. I was not asked why and I don't recall knowing why.

Seventeen years later, I returned to church for two reasons: I missed it, and I had two small children and couldn't bear that they grow up without Church. I had several intellectual and spiritual misgivings, but I found St. Paul's. Or it found me. I returned to St. Paul's because of the beauty and thoughtfulness of the sermons. And for the sense of the sacred which my protestant background had muted. I became active, my children were baptized, my husband joined us, and here I am – along with him – decades later. I have always been in the pew, but found other sources of worship: at the altar as an acolyte, at the lectern as a reader, and in the conference room for adult education. Through the years, I have directed adult education programs, developed with our priest a Lenten retreat, edited our church newsletter, and contributed to our Taize worship. Some of my fondest memories are of welcoming new parishioners and after coffee hour helping clean up with others. I am serving a second term on the vestry. I am an engaged mother and grandmother, and I have had an active professional life as a teacher, now occasionally volunteering as an ESL tutor, life-long learning professor, and currently serve as a board member of our local library.

Marilyn is extremely devoted to the ongoing spiritual life and health of St. Paul's. She will sit with visitors at coffee hour until the visitor is ready to end the conversation. Perhaps the most recent example of Marilyn's devotion to St. Paul's was her suggestion (insistence?!) that we consider our parish life beyond what is found on the budget worksheet. What's important to us? What projects and goals should our funds be used towards? We had just started those conversations when Covid put a halt to in-person gatherings. 

St. Lawrence, *Libertyville* **2021 Distinguished Woman**

Susie Brock and St. Lawrence Church have literally grown together and is now our longest standing parishioner. She was baptized and confirmed here and served as our first female acolyte. She was married at St. Lawrence and



both of her children were baptized here. She and her mother were ECW members.

As our Parish Administrator for 17 years, Susie performs her job responsibilities exceptionally well, yet this is the least of her strengths. She practices radical hospitality to all who visit and offers compassion, a sympathetic ear, and collaborative problem solving. Susie develops parishioner gifts to help them grow more fully into leadership and their faith and she is extremely imaginative and resourceful and helpful for a cash-strapped congregation.

In addition to clergy/ministry team support, Susie initiates programs for the women and children of St. Lawrence. Young children enjoy her worship "Soft Space" and at the annual meeting, they enjoy her "Sunday Funday" activities. She started the "Godly Play" program 6 years ago, with the vestry teaching the young children. and organizes the women of the parish to provide potluck dinners and informs parishioners of the United Thank Offering Sunday. Programs that Susie has initiated connects St. Lawrence with Libertyville and beyond. Parish women created 400+ girls' dresses from pillowcases in the "Little Dresses for Africa" program. The prayer shawl ministry creates/distributes hundreds of shawls knitted in prayer for those in need of spiritual comfort and warmth. For 3 years, the parish fundraiser "Church Street Market" has operated with vendors/farmers selling goods to benefit parish ministries. As an act of comfort and Christianity, Susie always had food available for needier visitors to St. Lawrence. Her simple boxes of graham crackers have grown into providing food to 70+ families weekly through our independent HOPE Food Pantry, partnered with the Northern Illinois Food Bank.

A life-long Libertyville resident, Susie is active in her community. She has volunteered for 6 years with Conserve Lake County. As a small business owner, Susie served on the Board for MainStreet Libertyville and began "Lunch in the Park" which has been held for 23 years!

Susie has contributed to the Diocese and National Church, too. She and The Rev. Vicki Garvey ran the children's program at the Diocesan Convention for 8 years, and in 2018, she was selected to develop and implement children's programs for The Episcopal General Convention including care for the children of vendors, General Convention and ECW Triennial attendees in Austin, Texas.

Susie personifies the words of Mother Teresa, "Small things done with great love will change the world".

I am greatly honored that I have been named as an Episcopal Church Women (ECW) Honored Woman 2021 this year by Calvary Episcopal Church, Lombard.

I have been a member at Calvary for 38 years. I started attending Calvary when I was in college. I was married at Calvary, my kids were baptized at Calvary and they were married by Calvary's priest at the time, Pastor Emily Mellott. Now, my grandchildren have been baptized at Calvary.

In that time, I have served our congregation and Diocese in various ministries. As soon as I graduated college with an accounting degree, I started counting the weekly donations. From there I went on to teach church school starting with the pre-school group and continued all the way up to Rite 13 and Journey to Adulthood groups. One of my most fulfilling roles was as the Rite 13 and Journey to Adulthood leader. The relationships and fond memories of our time together will stay with me for the rest of my life.

I was also the President of Calvary's ECW and served on the Diocesan ECW board and eventually I became the Diocesan United Thank Offering coordinator. I have served on the vestry as the fellowship chair, Senior Warden and Finance chair. Currently, I am the finance chair and the church treasurer. I have also organized and volunteered for numerous fellowship and fundraising events at our church.

The last thing I thought I would be working on at the church is the livestreaming of the service. During the pandemic, I have learned more about livestreaming than I ever imagined possible given that I am not a techy kind of person. However, when things change that we have no control over, we all must pitch in and learn what we can so our worship and ministry can continue even during a pandemic. I wonder what God intends for me to do next.

The Church has meant so much to me and my family for my entire adult life. Calvary is an extension of our family. When I am serving, I feel my relationship with God grows exponentially.





Barb Plantz is a devoted wife, sister, mother and grandmother, who has become a fixture in the southwestern suburbs of Chicago as a woman of fortitude and Christian discipleship in her community.

Coming to this congregation in New Lenox after years of service as a teacher and as social worker, Barb immediately made a huge impact of the life of our congregation, and in turn her own faith journey has flourished. In her decade at Grace Church, Barb has volunteered in numerous realms of parish life: organizing clothing and food drives for a local mission; serving on the Altar Guild, participating as a devout member of our Bible Study group and Adult Forum courses, cochairing the last Rector Search Committee; and most especially leading the congregation as our Senior Warden for three straight years.

But Barb is perhaps best known for the intangibles, the little things - noticing when someone needs help in the church kitchen, or when to fill in for an absent lector in worship, or helping make deliveries on Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday to parishioner homes in lockdown. She has cared immensely for a 98-year-old member of our church, walking alongside him as he phased into assisted living and becoming a surrogate daughter in so many respects.

Parishioners and strangers alike know that Barb will drop everything to listen, to pray with them, or to hop in the car and help out in however she is needed. Her ministry to the church is a textbook example of "servant leadership," and in her own unabashed humility, she would allow that she is simply doing what is need - the right thing, in every instance.

In 2020, just before the COVID-19 pandemic, Barb stood at the altar of our church sanctuary and professed her newly-matured faith as Bishop Jeffrey Lee received her into the Episcopal Church, cementing her as a sacramental and ideological leader in our congregation for all ages and all genders.

Now Barb is helping to design a new outreach program to serve the local community in financial distress post-pandemic. We could not be more proud of her leadership, and her drive to help others and care for all God's people. When our worship ends with "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord," the people of Grace know that Barb Plantz embodies that missional cause and lives it out day after day.

Leadership Views from Women Leaders in the Diocese

I read an article recently which spoke to leaders managing their program areas as the CEO of their areas. This really spoke to me as to the culture I try to foster. And I am always actively trying to manage the bench in terms of succession planning since developing future leaders is the key to long term sustainability and growth and also leads to a healthy work culture when others can see they too can have a leadership seat.



I am recommending Mrs. Hilda Eunsoo Lee, not only an exemplary Episcopal church woman but also an exemplary Christian. She became Anglican in early childhood in Korea and member of One In Christ since 2000. She is an incredible woman



like Mary and Martha at the same time. I would like to call her an "all around Episcopal Church woman".

When the COVID-19 pandemic lock down started, she and her husband, and my wife and myself did worship services and broadcasting for many months. She has been the lector for not only the church service but also for Diocesan conventions and Episcopal Asian Consultation. She comes to church on every Saturday morning service at 7:00am and reads the scriptures and responses together. She has been a choir member, soloist, and a leader of worship dance. She also participates in building and grounds projects. For example, she bended knee and patched cracks in the parking lot last fall.

Sister Hilda was a Sunday school teacher for more than 15 years. She always has been a teacher to prepare most supply and programs for the summer Vacation Bible school. She loves children so much that many people have asked her to be God mother because of her loving care of children. She did voluntary babysitting whenever younger families needed care.

Her loving care reaches beyond age. Whenever we celebrate our life passages and church calendar seasons, she decorates, beautify, and prepares so many things. Her loving care of people is imprinted in many people's hearts forever.

Sister Hilda is an evangelist like the Samaritan woman. She shared the benefits of good news, and programs to others and brought many people to the programs. She has shared her stories of struggle as an immigrant, her identity in the new country, her marriage life, and faith journey with vulnerability. With her sharing her story, many peoples are encouraged, healed, and stand up for calling. She is also actively participating on social justice and civic engagement, like Anti Rally of Comfort women, Black Lives Matter Movements, and Stop Asian Hate.

John became the organist and choir director at St. Peter's and Barb's beautiful voice became an important part of the choir until her retirement in 2016. Barb was elected to the Diocesan ECW board and served for twelve years: as treasurer for 6 years and president for 3 years. Barb was blessed to meet many people during her tenure and as a delegate to Diocesan conventions and Triennial meetings.

Barb was a Eucharistic Minister at St. Peter's and has been the Directress of the Altar Guild for 45 years. Our altar is always carefully adorned and beautifully kept. As a member of our Worship committee, Barb's knowledge and willingness to serve is invaluable. Barb has been on numerous committees and chairman of many. She can often be seen at the church or in the office, working on projects and assisting our bookkeeper. Sue Bennett and her husband Mike Hippler joined Saint James over three years ago. Sue is a lifelong Episcopalian. She and Mike jumped right into the life of our parish and she is a Vestry member. Sue is a mother of two boys and the stepmother of two more boys.

Sue made two huge positive impacts on the life of the entire parish in 2020. In January, Sue shared her personal journey of how her eldest son (Nick), was incarcerated due to drug charges. He is serving ten years in the Shawnee Correctional Center in Vienna, IL. Sue shared how the State of Illinois legal system provides little if any support to inmates or their families from court to incarceration. Sue discovered the State of Illinois offers programs for inmates and their families, but they are not funded so technically nothing is available to serve them. Her story left no dry eyes as we felt her pain and frustration as she advocated on her son's behalf. That Sunday the parish decided to make Prison and Justice Reform a part of our social justice ministry. Saint James is developing a program to educate and advocate on behalf of prison and justice reform for inmates and families. We have been in touch with St. Leonard's Ministry and Books@Prisioners, a program collecting and distributing all kinds of reading materials to inmates based on their interests.

Then on March 15, 2020 when Bishop Lee asked the parishes to close to in-person worship due to the pandemic, Sue stepped up and offered to get the parish set up on her Zoom business account for Sunday at home worship. Sue then led a group of talented parishioners that connected the ethernet, our sound system, a laptop, and a webcam to Zoom from the church. Sue has also led the Zoom team in training new people to help broadcast our services. Because of Sue, we did not miss a beat in staying connected as a parish online.

Sue Bennett has helped us to look outside ourselves by serving others through social justice. She also helped us to stay connected as the Body of Christ during these challenging times. We cannot thank Sue enough for her servant actions during this time of COVID-19.



Episcopal Church Women has 4 levels of organization.

- 1. The **parish** level serves women in each church. Women gather in service, share their faith, attend educational programs and hold a variety of gatherings suited to the particular needs of the women of the parish.
- 2. The **diocesan** level provides connection between the parishes through programs and events. The diocesan leaders inform the province leaders of issues and concerns in their diocese.
- 3. The **province** level reaches out to all the women of the region and the leaders of the dioceses and sends representatives to the national level. All women of the region are invited to attend the annual meeting held each spring. We share the business of our organization, enjoy speakers and workshops and share in the sisterhood of the Episcopal Church Women.
- 4. The **national** level provides the connections to the provinces and establishes the policies and procedures for all levels of the organization. Every three years the national board hosts the Triennial meeting, which is scheduled during the General Convention of The Episcopal Church. The ECW President of Province 5 attends the Triennial as our representative. The president and the other delegates from each diocese and province conduct the business of the organization and attend educational forums. General members may also attend as observers.

The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) of the Diocese of Chicago have served the women of our diocese for over 135 years through service, sharing our faith, and through our personal relationships with one another. We seek to support all women in our parishes and those who identify as women, without restriction by creating a greater connection between us through our faith and sisterhood with programs of education and service.
