

Convener's Report

Overview of 2020

At our last Annual meeting, November 14, 2020, I presented the challenges ECW-Chicago faces, which are the same challenges any religious organization faces, namely declining membership and engagement. To our surprise and delight, Zoom has been shown to be a blessing, enabling much more engagement in our events from not only around the diocese, but from other dioceses and other countries. This revelation has shown us that Zoom must been firmly part of our future events and meetings. All of our monthly Board meetings have been on Zoom, as have committee meetings. Our 2021 calendar includes a virtual Altar Guild Conference (September 18) and a hybrid Fall Retreat (October 15-17).

Your Board has considered how to improve the communications with all members, to which end, Beth Petti has assumed the role of Communications/Website Chair, building on last year's project of updating our website. We have also added a donation button (PayPal) to the website to enable on-line donations (our events can always use a little "seed money"). Beth has also retooled "The Mirror" into a quarterly online newsletter to provide information about what is happening across the diocese (she needs your articles, please), as well as notification of upcoming events. Remember that all ECW-Chicago meetings are open, and if you want to participate or just listen in, let one of us know so that you receive the login or dial-in information.

The Board took up the job of reviewing and rewriting our Bylaws and accompanying Policies and Procedures documents to reflect our current realities as well as provide flexibility to grow and change as our organizational needs require. The Bylaws are presented at this meeting for your approval, and I encourage you to approve them. We are also presenting a candidate for President, a position which has been open since 2019. We are seeking a candidate for Secretary as May Anstee needs to retire from service (Thanks for everything, May. We will miss you).

Early in 2021, we welcomed 5 women to join our Board, which was more good news. Our best hope for the future of ECW-Chicago as an enabler of ministries to women, children and families is in your continued and increased involvement. Consider volunteering to help with one of our events if you aren't quite sure about joining the board or contact a board member to discuss your interests. WE NEED YOUR PARTICIPATION.

ECW-Chicago received a pandemic benefit in the form of much lower expenses for events, mainly no hospitality costs. Despite that, the events (Annual Meeting and Fall Retreat) happened and were enjoyed by many more women than in-person events have typically been drawing. This enabled us to consider more 2021 Annual Giving.

The 2021 Budget Administrative Expenses, approved by the Board in October, 2020, reflects \$6,000 of Triennial expenses which we now know will not be spent in 2021, and the Event Expenses assumed all virtual-only events. We are now planning for a hybrid Fall Retreat to be held at DeKoven Retreat Center in Racine, Wisconsin, with major portions being livestreamed on Zoom. This will increase expenses, but will hopefully be mostly offset by registration fees.

The Balance Sheet shows an increase of \$28,184 due partially to our 2020 net profit and partially to investing more of our prior years' surpluses into the Diocesan Foundation and the subsequent market rise.

The rest of my downtime is filled with watching movies, taking very long walks as my mind wanders, eating anything & everything, and listening to podcasts.



2021 UTO Report for the ECW Annual Meeting

This year the Diocese of Chicago was blessed to receive two UTO Grants. Many thanks to the United Thank Offering Grant Team! I am blessed to work with five people representing four churches: Catherine Balassie from St Hugh of Lincoln, Elgin; Betsy Barnett from St. Lawrence, Libertyville; Maryfran Crist, Grace, Pontiac; Beth Petti from Trinity, Wheaton; and The Rev. Hal Toberman from St. Lawrence, Libertyville. We also received Diocesan support from Anne Cothran and Jennifer Boyle-Tucker. The Rev. Canon Heather Melton (staff officer for United Thank Offering) was especially helpful in answering my questions and those of our Grant Team.

The 2020 Grant focus was, Recovering with Love and Gratitude: An Episcopal Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic in Local Contexts. Two granting sessions were offered, and the Diocese of Chicago received a UTO Grant in both sessions. Of the 130 Grant applications received, 53 were granted, with the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago receiving two.

In January Bishop Anderson House received: \$23,560 for Pastoral Care Relief Training Course Development

In April Lawrence Hall received: \$4,720— Sustaining Project WORK — software update

A little history -

Offering in 2015 to purchase much needed computer hardware for our South
Shore community workforce development programs (Project Work), allowing
both program staff and youth to more quickly and efficiently access and
document a variety of information for a host of program activities.

Update: per Fr Jonathan Thomas, St Paul's Peoria, UTO Grant \$62,000

"We are progressing on the garden nicely, the lots are tilled, and soil ameliorated. We have gotten approval from the city on fencing that should be installed soon. And the planting will begin in the near future for this growing season. We have not been able to have cooking classes yet because Covid precautions have prohibited that sort of activity. We have been working with a nutritionist to plan for classes when we get to a place where everyone is comfortable with that. We have gone through all steps to get our kitchen at church fully licensed and

inspected by the health department to be able to offer the classes here. So, the best answer is, we have taken all the preparatory steps that the pandemic would allow since September and will begin to see this vision realized in the coming months."

During the second cycle of Episcopal Church, Anglican Communion COVID-19 grants, United Thank Offering awarded \$479,369.53 They received almost \$1.4 million in requests. A quick history: over the last two years The Diocese of Chicago has been blessed with \$90,280 in UTO grant money. And since its founding in 1889, UTO has awarded 5,384 grants for a total of \$141,104,725.30

I would like to thank everyone who, through a personal spiritual discipline of gratitude, contributed to the United Thank Offering's Ingathering in 2020. It was a difficult year for many. We had 42% fewer churches that participated, and the amount that we contributed was down 57% from 2019 due to the pandemic, people hurting, and church buildings closed as never before in our lifetime. However, I choose to see this in a very positive light. We still had churches that found a way to do ingatherings, and we had several very generous individuals donate directly to UTO. Remember to say the blue box prayer:

Almighty God, I give you praise for blessing me in many ways.

Create in me a grateful heart and with this gift a blessing start. Amen.
