Sun is rising...it is late October in the early morning and I can see

the opposite shoreline on Allequash. The ducks - bluebills - don't seem to care if a mallard imposter is calling on the opposite shore. The best hunting time is passing fast and Ivory, my white lab, has given up and roams the shoreline. She knows the hunt is over before I do.

My whistles are keeping her within 50 yards and they are also attracting the attention of the flock of trumpeter swans on the far southwest end of the lake. The trumpeting

starts - they are suddenly closer. Together, but separate in families, perhaps a dozen in total, they are being led by a big mature swan. She has seen the white dog on the shoreline. It dawns on me that she is coming for Ivory. It is time for the flock to leave for the south and she thinks there is an orphan, roaming the shoreline, that needs leadership. The trumpets grow in volume as the flock begins to call out. This is a magic mo-



ment, a rare encounter but Ivory couldn't care less. For her, its birds in the mouth and being a hero with a retrieve...and the dog treat that always follows.

The journal entry above comes from 2014 and the young dog and the old hunter may have seen the cygnets that now have claimed Plum lake as young adults.

We might have two pairs of trumpeters that have claimed the lake. The pair on the east end showed up right at ice out and has been here most days since. They were challenged as Anita and I watched, by another pair of swans that flew in and got



aggressive. They left quickly when the big male on the log in front of our house took the fighting pose. It is probably the second pair that are seen on the west end and West Plum today.

Neither are nesting yet, but territory has been claimed. Our pair is here every morning. Large nesting platforms may help us keep them around. Could be a winter project.

Here are some stats on trumpeter swans in Wisconsin.

- On endangered species list until the mid 1980's
- WDNR began its trumpeter recovery program in 1987 in the north.
- By 1999, 30 breeding pairs, 80 young, 60-70 of which survived to fledge.
- Weight 21-30 pounds, wing span to 7 feet
- Pairs up by age 4, breeds from age 4 to 7.
- Often mates for life to 30 years
- First introduced here in Irving and Allequash. Both produced broods.
- Male called a "cob", female called a "pen"
